

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Borough Officials to Meet with DEP to Discuss Hollywood Avenue Truck Route

Several members of the Ad hoc Alternate Truck Route Committee will hold a preliminary meeting with N.J. Department of Environment Protection (DEP) Commissioner Bob Martin in Trenton on September 13 to discuss their intentions regarding the Hollywood Avenue truck bypass route prior to submitting design plans and permits in October.

According to Remington & Vernick engineer Terry Vogt, the survey and traffic study are 95% complete. The borough, however, still must obtain written consent from several property owners who will be affected by the project.

Councilwoman Chrissy Buteas, who arranged the meeting with the commissioner and other high ranking officials, plans to attend, along with Mayor Charles Butrico, Council President Matt Anesh, ad hoc committee member Frank Mikorski and representatives of the engineering firm.

of the engineering firm.

The purpose of the meeting, says Buteas, is to get the "new administration up to speed" with the project so there are "no surprises" when the per-

mit application is submitted

"I think it is imperative that the ad hoc committee meet with the DEP and the new administration in Trenton and brief them on the most important project pending in South Plainfield. I am pleased representatives of the DEP will meet with us to discuss such a critical issue to our residents and businesses," explained Buteas.

Anesh also plans to formally request a meeting with Lt. Governor Kim Guadagno and Governor Chris Christie as he feels this project warrants their attention.

Ad hoc Chair Mike English suggested that the council pass a resolution at its next meeting on September 7 endorsing the project. The borough passed an ordinance in June, bonding for \$122,000 to be used toward the initial costs associated with the engineers' design and permits. Application fees for the permits are estimated at approximately \$50,000, and it is uncertain at this point as to how long the approval process will take.

"Roughly four years ago, the idea of extending Hollywood Avenue was thought to be merely political baloney," said Anesh, who is pleased that the proposed extension is nearing the application phase with the support of the council. "While the project still faces challenges in the near future, including a potential legal fight and millions of dollars of funding, the filing of the permit will force the DEP to evaluate the project and will bring us one step closer to meeting the additional challenges that lie ahead." Anesh continues to meet with Congressman Leonard Lance to discuss future federal funding opportunities to complete the road.

The ad hoc committee was formed shortly after environmental group, Edison Wetlands Association (EWA), helped put an end to the Helen Street Extension Project almost four years earlier. EWA Chairman Bob Spiegel voiced his objections to the Hollywood Avenue project after the com-mittee tried to gain his support a year ago. The new truck route, which will connect Hollywood Avenue (off Hamilton Boulevard and Ryan Street) to Metuchen Road, will sizably reduce the amount of truck traffic passing through the borough. It will have a lesser impact on the 660-acre Dismal Swamp wetlands than the definct Helen Street Project, which the EWA wants to protect at all costs.

"I am hopeful that we will have the opportunity to lay out our plans for the truck route," said Butrico. "We need to explain why this is so important to our community and how we have to balance the safety of our residents, the Dismal Swamp and nature."

The truck committee's next meeting is scheduled for Monday, Sept. 27 at 7 p.m. at the Senior Center and is open to the public.



would remove the silt and remaining-portion of the vegetation.

Mayor Charles Butrico com-mented, "The park is a reflection of the community and it's important to keep it clean. I am happy that the county works hard every day to pick up trash and is planning to clean up the vegetation in the lake as well."

Councilwoman Chrissy Buteas added, "I appreciate the county's

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
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Annual Mayor's Cup Softball Game to Kick off Labor Day Weekend Celebrations

Addi-tionally, Rusty's 'Hawaiian won the Hawaii Coffee Association's 2010 Cupping Competition in July besting 67 other farmers throughout the state with a score of 91.1 out of 100.

Success was bittersweet for Lorie,

whose husband, Restituto "Rusty" Obra, passed away from cancer in 2006. It was Rusty's dream to make Ka'u coffee one of the elite coffees in the world; however, after his passing Lorie was not sure if she would continue to work the farm, or sell.

Since committing herself to seeing her husbands' dream through, Lorie has single-handedly run the 12-acre estate farm, from harvesting and processing to roasting and marketing the coffee at the local farmer's market. Her hard work and determination was re cently recognized with these two highly

regarded honors in the coffee industry. The Obras' journey to Hawaii began in the early 1970s, when Rusty and Lorie immigrated to the United and Lorie immigrated to the Office. States from the Philippines, eventually settling in South Plainfield. For 28 years, they lived the American Dream, worked hard and raised their o children. Rusty Jr., 33, resides in Wharton with wife Amy. He is a chef at Copeland Restaurant in Morristown. Daughter Joan, 36, resides in Fresno, Calif. with husband Ralph. She is the food writer for The Fresno Bee

newspaper-in Central California. Rusty Sr., a chemist by trade, was offered early retirement from his job in 1998. He and Lorie, a medical techmologist, knew that they wanted to relocate to the Big Island of Hawaii. "They were thinking either a bed-and-breakfast or a Dunkin' Donuts

franchise," said Rusty Jr. of his parents. "It was during a trip to a friend's coffee farm that they fell in love with what they saw. This was how Rusty's Hawaian 100% Ka'u Coffee was born."

The two then embarked on a new chapter in their lives.

In 1999 Rusty cleared and prepared the land in the fertile Ka'u region of Hawaii. He planted 7,000 keiki trees, and by 2003 had purchased all the necessary machinery and equipment to begin the coffee production process. At the SCAE's annual Awards for Coffee Excellence dinner held in London on June 23, Board Member Colin Smith called Obra's accomplishments in coffee farming "exemplary and an inspiration to the specialty coffee industry." Andrew Hetzel, a coffee industry." Andrew Hetzel, Hawaii resident and organizer of the SCAE's recent tour of Hawaii Island's coffee farming regions, accepted the trophy on behalf of Obra.

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

While talking to residents I've been hearing a lot about how the Democrat candidate for mayor is telling people he'll cut taxes and spending if elected. Lots of politicians are big talkers, but they don't back up their promises in office. It's, hard to tell which candidates are all talk, but it's easier if the candidate has a record. In Mr. English's case, he has an extensive one. In light of that record, I'll let readers judge whether his promises are believable.

His first year as mayor (1983), English raised taxes 55%. I was shocked by that figure, so I confirmed it by looking at the official borough audit. It was true. Spending also soared that year, up almost \$1,000,000.

English's record as head of the South Plainfield Housing Authority also shed some light on his ability to manage and to control spending. That group was formed in 1986 and was

charged with building senior housing. Under English, the project languished for years and was plagued with constantly escalating costs. Money was being spent like there was no tomorrow, which prompted the *News Tribune* in 1994 to run an editorial called, "A Housing Aurhority Needs a Goal Beyond Spending. The opening line went like this:

"South Plainfield's housing au-

thority is an emblem of what people hate about government.

English's proposed plan was never built, and hundreds of thousands of dollars in engineering and architec-tural fees were wasted. Senior housing vas indeed built many years later, bu that was long after English's plan had been discarded. In the end, the town paid dearly in time and money for English's inexperience and mistakes.

Two decades later English resurfaced and got elected to the school board. Taxes soared again. School taxes went up over \$50 a home his first year (2004), and during his second year the average home saw a \$375 spike. Before English quit the board in 2005 he had raised taxes on the average home by over \$425 in just

Mike English has probably raised taxes more than any elected official in South Plainfield history. Given this record, one has to wonder whether the talk about being a tax cutter has any credibility whatsoever. To me it's all bluster.
