In Honor of the Service & Sacrifice

The heroes and victims of September 11, 2001a day etched in the minds of all Americans-were honored by the South Plainfield Elks Lodge #2298 at a Patriot Day ceremony.

Following a welcome by Exalted Ruler Bill Reuter and a prayer by Peter Smith, Elks members offered words of remembrance.

Mayor Charles Butrico spoke to the audience about the significance of 9/11 to the history of this country, and then presented Reuter and the Elks with a Patriot Day Proclamation on behalf of the Borough Council. Councilman Rob Bengivenga offered a personal experience from 9/11. "September 11th is a day of remembrance

and honor," he began. "I remember nine years ago. I was asleep in my dorm room when my roommate came in saying his dad's building just got hit by a plane. I asked him what he meant. He said the Pentagon and the World Trade Center had been hit. We turned on the TV and that's when I saw the buildings burning. I looked at him and said my aunt is in one of those buildings. No phones worked that day, and as tears came down our eyes, we got word his father was okay and eve risked his life to help save others. Unfortunately, my aunt was not so lucky, and she will be forever remembered. We need to always remember the spirit

Exalted Ruler Bill Reuter had this to say: "Our Patriot Day service is a simple, but very moving, service. It is a way for we, as Elks, to honor the victims of 9/11 and to honor the men and women who have put on the uniforms of our armed services.'

of the SP Historical Society, On Sunday, Sept. 19 at 11:30 a.m., an historic marker will be dedicated honoring the First Baptist Church of South Plainfield.

The church is, in the words of past Historical Society President Larry Randolph, "the oldest living link to South Plainfield's past" which "can trace its origin back to the first settlers of Piscataway Township." The structure has been located at 201 Hamilton Blvd. since 1879. The original meeting house was built in 1792 on what is now the site of the Baptist cemetery on New Market Avenue.

Please join the Historical Society, Pastor Gordon Braun, Mayor Charles Butrico, council members and the congregation for a short ceremony honoring the history and heritage of the First Baptist Church of South Plainfield.

The historic marker is a gift from county freeholders and the Middlesex County Cultural and Heritage Com-mission. The Historical Society nominated the church for the award in 2005. The words on the marker are those of (Continued on page 5)

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

First off, we'll be restarting Sunday operating hours this weekend. So, to review, here is our schedule: We're open on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m.; Tuesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., Saturday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Sunday from 1:30 to 5 p.m. We'll let you know about any changes.

Miss Linda and Miss Mija are away, so children's programs have been cancelled. They'll be starting up again on Tuesday, Oct. 5. We should all be recharged from

our summer activities by then.

At this writing, we're still working on making needed upgrades to our computer system which would allow more of our public computers to be available. We hope to have this all fixed up in the very near future. We appreciate your patience until then. By the way, please remember that you must stop by the reference desk to reserve a computer before it can be used, and that usage times have now been limited to periods of 30 minutes, with time renewals based on availability.

We've mentioned this several times before, but it bears repeating. Last week, we started a new policy regarding young people who use the library. Specifically, on weekdays from 2:30 to 6 p.m., young people age 12 to who aren't accompanied by an adult must present their library card (their own card, not someone else's) and a photo I.D. (such as school I.D.) in order to be admitted into the building. Anyone who doesn't qualify on that basis will be instructed to leave. Regarding the photo I.D., young people may, with direct parental per-mission, have their photos taken by our new circulation desk camera for inclusion in our files (and only our

files) for future identification.

Now, make no mistake. We at the library do not relish having to card young people under these circumstances. In fact, it's a stone drag to have to resort to this, since the major ity of young people who use our fa-cilities are well-behaved and respectful of others. However, our experiences with a small but very disruptive group of young people have forced us to take this action in the interests of both our staff and other patrons. If you have questions or comments about this or any library policy, don't hesi-

tate to get in touch with us.



McConville said he's also afraid the Democrats will try to ram through this complex if they take back the council majority. "Seven hundred apartments would decimate Roosevelt School. We were able to stop it tem-porarily, but we're sure Harris Steel

will be back to try again," he said.
"The Democrats pushed this plan earlier this year, yet oddly their candidates for mayor and council have been missing in action when it comes to commenting on it," added Anesh.
"We hoped they would have joined us
in fighting it, but they haven't."

McConville agreed. "English, Williams and Sorrentino have failed to take a position. Their party was pushing it. So, that begs the question: Do

they support it too?"
"This is a vital issue for residents," added Anesh, who stood up against adding the apartments even before being sworn in as a council-man in January. "Our opponents keep promising straight talk, so why are they so quiet on this?"
