Basketball Team Speaks Out for Coach Schulte

In an effort to prevent South Plain-field High School basketball coach Bill Schulte from being removed from his position, members and former members of the varsity basketball team attended the September 20 Board of Education meeting. They

spoke about the training they received and how, through Schulte's efforts, their teams had come together to have

SPHS Athletic Director Michael Buggey had recommended that Schulte continue in his position; however, Superintendent of Schools Jose Negron pulled Schulte's name

and refused to recommend him for the position he has held for the past seven years. No other person was recommended.

Sophomore Denzel Mensah, with team members standing behind him, recounted last year's 4-17 losing record.
"He [Schulte] tried as hard as he

could. He will have a better average this year. He helps everyone out and teaches us how to be a man. The summer varsity came together; give Schulte a chance. To remove the coach

will hurt us a lot," said Mensah. Former players Shamai Santiago (2007) and Mike Burton (2009) recalled how they had to work on their basketball skills and how, by following through on Schulte's advice, they were on winning teams. Both still play basketball; Santiago for Middlesex County College and Burton for Kean University.

"You can't vote the coach out be cause of the results of the team. He shouldn't be punished for the results of a team. He's a great coach!" ex-

plained Santiago.
"Thank you guys," said Schulte, before reviewing his record as a teacher, coach and a longtime resident of South Plainfield.

"I lived most of my life in South Plainfield. My dad was a member of the Board of Education for eight years and my mother worked for the board in the business office. In 1977 I came to the high school as a gym teacher. Pve had 367 wins in basketball, but it's not about winning, but how to be a human being and suffer through

"Mr. Negron, you've only been here for three years. I don't feel you know me as a teacher, educator and coach," Schulte said.

Whether or not the students' pleas will help to keep Schulte in his position will not be known until the October board meeting when the position is expected to be filled to prepare for the winter basketball season that begins in November.

Repaying to Include Speed Tables

Stilo Paving & Excavating of South Plainfield was awarded the contract to repave Cherry Street between Clinton and New Brunswick avenues at the September 20 Borough Council meeting.

The project's estimated cost of \$175,000 will include three speed tables. The tables are flat-topped speed humps and are generally long enough for the entire wheelbase of a passenger car to rest above. The design allows for more gradual slowing of vehicle speed than humps. The long, flat

design allows cars to pass without slowing as significantly as required with speed humps. Typically the tables have six-foot ramps on each side with a 10-foot wide flat top and are three to four inches in height. Similar speed tables have been installed on Lane and Lake avenues.

According to CFO Glenn Cullen, surplus grant money from Middlesex County from the recent paving of a portion of New Market Avenue will pay for a large portion of the cost. An additional \$55,000 will come from grant monies remaining after completion of the Linden Avenue paving project two years ago.

Service to Others What Squires Do Best

On August 28, the Squires spent a long work day completing a number of projects. They began with a four hour project at Our Lady of Czestochowa Church where they did an extensive landscaping clean up. The Squires and a few members of the Knights of Columbus removed debris and trimmed bushes around the church and hall. Trees were also topped.

The next project involved num-erous safety issues for an 81-yearold senior citizen. With the help of Grand Knight Bill Butrico and other Knights, the Squires replaced a dangerous handicap ramp. The boys constructed a wooden ramp, complete with railings that were previously missing. They poured a concrete pad to connect the ramp to the adjacent driveway and installed sturdy hand rails on either side of the stairs leading to the basement. The original single hand rail had been installed over 50 years ago. The boys worked for more than six hours and the resident was very grateful. Prior to the repairs, the resident had to move very cautiously up and down the basement steps in order to avoid serious injury.

As Squire members, the boys find time to volunteer to help others despite their many school, music, sports activities and other commitments. While working at the various jobs they learn the importance of helping those in need, learn new skills as well as the value of teamwork.

Earlier in the year the boys held

a garage sale to help fund their various charitable endeavors. They also assisted the Knights of Columbus at the concession stand during the September 18 Somerset Patriots baseball game. More than 40 Knights, Squires and family members volunteered that evening. They also manned the Shoot Out the Star booth at the OLC fair. Other projects included painting a house,

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
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The paper shredding truck filled up quickly last Saturday at the Senior Center and many residents had to be turned away.

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
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



Anesh, McConville, Rusnak: We Need to Move Forward

Saying now is not the time to go backward, mayoral candidate Matt Anesh this week talked about his team's record of results and the forward-looking agenda they are run-

ning on.
"My runningmates and I have a forward-looking agenda," said Anesh. "But we also have the results to show we can achieve it."

"We cut taxes for the average family by \$178, cut spending and reduced borrowing," Anesh said.
"When we said last year that controlling taxes and spending would be our top goal, we meant it. In 2011, our priority will continue to be making South Plainfield more affordable.'

South Plainfield is one of a select few towns in the state to see taxes go down," added Councilman Ray Rusnak, who is seeking re-election. "No other town in Central Jersey has that type of record."

But the Anesh team's agenda includes more than just finances.

"We're moving forward on impor-tant projects for families and seniors added Councilman Tim Mc-Conville, who is also seeking reelection. "We completed Stage I of the

New Market Avenue reconstruction, and we'll be repaying Cherry Street next month."

Anesh, McConville and Rusnak are also expanding the Safe Streets, Safe Kids program, an innovative safety program designed to make neighbords safer for families.

"We'll be adding speed tables to slow down traffic when we repave Cherry Street." Anesh explained. "We also passed a policy that handles and prioritizes requests for speed humps and tables. We have received several resident petitions, and as a result, we're looking to expand the program to even more streets next year."

Improving services for seniors is another goal, according to Rusnak. "For years the senior center has had prob-lems during cold weather. To remedy that, Councilman Bengivenga just an-nounced that the Borough received a grant to insulate the building, which should make everyone more comfortable this winter."

"We also fought to keep out the 700-unit apartment complex the Democrat Party tried to ram through in December," added Rusnak.

"Our opponents now say they op-

posed that project too, but they were mysteriously quiet when it was in front of the council," added Mc-Conville. "It's nice to say you oppose something, but why didn't they stand up to their party at the meetings or voice their concerns in the paper?"

The other side doesn't have a great record on taxes either, according to Anesh. "This year's tax cut is in sharp contrast to what happened in 1983 when Michael English became mayor. That year, taxes jumped 55%. The same thing happened when he went on the school board. In one year taxes

for the average family shot up \$375."
"We can't go back to that," said
McConville. "That's exactly what everyone is saying we need to get away from. Whether it's in Washington or Trenton, people are saying we can't continue to spend and tax like there's no tomorrow.

The difference between the two teams running for mayor and council is simple, according to Anesh: "This election is about the future versus the past. It's about moving forward or falling backward. The record shows that going back-ward would be a huge mistake. Let's take South Plainfield forward."

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
