### Residential **Sewer Rates To Rise 8.6%**

The Borough Council introduced an ordinance at its December 6 meeting increasing the fee structure for the Middlesex County Utilities Authority (MCUA) residential, commercial and industrial users. Homeowners will see their bill go up 8.6%, from \$290 to \$315. The minimum commercial rate will be \$580, a 10% increase.

Voting in favor of the increase were Republicans Matthew Anesh, Rob Bengivenga, Tim McConville and Rusnak. Councilwoman Chrissy Buteas voted against the measure. Franky Salerno was not present.

According to Borough CFO/ Administrator Glenn Cullen, the increases are due in part to the reduction of industrial customers who went out of business.

# Tree Lighting, Caroling Saturday



# **GOP Nominates Three to** ll Vacant Council Seat

The South Plainfield Republican Organization announced will be choosing from three of their members to fill the Borough Council seat vacated by Council President Matt Anesh when he is sworn in as mayor at the annual reorganization meeting at the Senior Center on January 2 at 1 p.m. Anesh will be the town's first Republican mayor in 23 years.

The nominees are Bob Jones, a former BOE member and party chair and current Zoning Board of Adjustment member; Alex Barletta, Zoning Board chairman; and Derrick White, Republican Committee member.

According to Anesh, an appointment could be made as early as the December 20 public meeting, or it will be announced on January 2. "The committee has come up with three very good individuals," said Anesh, who believes the party has a "very bright

Republican Councilmen Tim McConville and Ray Rusnak also retained their seats in the November 2 election. The GOP will remain in control of the council, holding four of the six seats.

A special election will be held in November 2011 to fill the remaining year of Anesh's three-year term on the council.

## Mentoring Program Returns to Kennedy

After a hiatus of a year, the Listen To Children program that matches students with seniors on a one-to-one basis, is returning to Kennedy School, The program utilizes the abilities of seniors to connect with elementaryaged youngsters on a weekly basis for 30 minutes to share experiences, games and crafts, and to establish a relationship that will help influence a student's self-esteem, communication and problem solving skills.

Diane Mandel brought the program to the district when she was hired as a student assistance counselor. Mandel, A former elementary school teacher, Mandel learned of the program in Livingston when she worked as a student intern while awaiting her certification as a student assistance counselor from Kean University.

A year after she was hired in 1998, a Listen To Children pilot program be-gan in the district at Kennedy School in 1999. Training for volunteers was supplied by the Mental Health Association of Essex County. The program

gradually expanded to each elementary school that had a SAC counselor. With the budget crunch in 2006, two SAC counselors were cut, and the next year two schools dropped out of the rogram. When Mandel retired as Kennedy

who had worked in the program. She also kept in touch with Kennedy School in order to bring the program back into the school.

In the beginning of December the program was reinstated at Kennedy School, and the volunteers were rewarded with having the opportunity to do what they do best-make a connection with the young children and to listen.

Once there, users can decide how they wish to receive their notifications, input mobile phone numbers and email addresses and join other alert groups.

All Middlesex County emergency notifications will be sent free of charge via email; users do not have to subscribe to the premium service offered on the United Alert Web site to receive email alerts from the Middlesex County Office of Emergency Management.

Middlesex County is the first county in the State of New Jersey to link into the United Alert system and offer it to residents.

the Edison treatment plant.

using for the past two years to help students prepare for the yearly mandated NJ ASK Language Arts Literacy and Mathematics testing given to Grant School's fifth and sixth graders, middle school students and to students in grades three and four at Franklin, Kennedy, Riley and Roosevelt elementary schools.

Since 1996, the state has mandated the implementation of testing programs to determine if students in the district's schools are making satisfac-tory progress according to the New ey Core Curriculum Content

In 2002 with the No Child Left Behind Act, the federal government required test data to be applied to 40 subgroups including students with disabilities, economically disadvantaged, limited English proficient students and ethnicity, and devised the Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) benchmarks indicating the percent of all students and subgroups that must fall into the proficient or advanced proficient categories for each test. South Plainfield High School

and Kennedy, Riley and Roosevelt elementary schools met all the benchmarks; however, the middle school, Grant School and Franklin Elementary School did not meet AYP, and each is now designated as a School

In Need of Improvement.
For the purpose of the AYP calculations, Grant School, with grades five and six, is considered both an elementary and a middle school. In 2007/2008 the sixth grade failed to achieve AYP because as a middle school there were five subgroups not achieving AYP in language arts. As a result, Grant School received the status of a School in Need of Improvement, Irr 2008/2009, Grant didn't reach the AYP benchmarks, and again in 2009/2010. Although the middle school eighth grade students did well in science, they did not meet the math standards. Testing in science was at 39.9% in the advanced proficient category, 52.5% proficient and 7.6% partially proficient. The students also performed well in language arts with scores of 8.2% partial proficient, 73.2% proficient and 18.6% advanced proficient. In comparison, eighth grade math students were 30.3% partially proficient compared to 22.6% last year and 24.8% in 2008; 46.2% proficient in 2010 compared to 52.5% in 2009, and 23.5% advanced proficient compared to 24.9% in 2009.

Seventh grade language testing

showed 24.2% partial proficient, 63% proficient and 12.8% advanced proficient. Math showed 31.7% partial proficient, 43.7% proficient and 24.7% advanced proficient.

Middle School Principal Kevin

Hajduk has outlined the following plan of action to improve scores in language arts and math:

- Implement a homework club from 2:30-3 p.m. after school four days a week;
- · Provide NJ ASK prep courses after school to targeted seventh and eighth grade students;
- Arrange guidance department meetings with at-risk students on a regular basis;
- · Provide continual reminders of the school's breakfast program so all students have the opportunity to begin school with an adequate, nutritional breakfast;
- · Establish two math periods (but not back to back) for students at risk: and
- Increase professional development for educators at Rutgers Institute for Improving Student Achievement.

Grant School Principal Leo Whalen has also set up an action plan to improve scores in language arts and

- · Develop an after school language arts literacy program to prepare students for the 2010-2011 NJASK;
- · Continue professional development for all teachers to reinforce writing across the curriculum and best practices in mathematics;

  • Develop an after school math-
- ematics program and a family math program; and
- Implement Study Island sessions at home and in school to supplement classroom instruction.
- The elementary school principals have written the following action plan to improve language arts and math:
- Encourage the use of Study Island at home in addition to in the classroom:
- · Implement the new writing pro-
- gram, "Being a Writer";

   Make NJ ASK preparation classes available for third and fourth grade students requiring extra help in lang-uage arts and math;
- Provide targeted needs instruction to small groups of students iden-tified with NJ ASK scores to ensure continued success; and
- · Continue the Family Math Program during the 2010/2011 school

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### Diegnan and Codey Co-Sponsor **State Concussion Legislation**

Assemblyman Patrick Diegnan and Senator Dick Codey were the prime assembly and senate sponsors of legislation recently signed into law by Governor Chris Christie. The legislation makes New Jersey a lead state in concussion awareness and protecting students who suffer a concussion.

The law mandates that "a studentathlete who sustains or is suspected of having sustained a concussion or other brain injury while engaged in a sports competition or practice is required to be immediately removed... and may not participate further until he is evaluated by a physician or other licensed healthcare provider trained in the evaluation and management of concussions and receives written clearance to return to competition."

Diegnan said, "A concussion is not a headache. It is a brain injury. I am amazed when I hear an announcer of an NFL or college football game state that a player has a "slight concussion." There is no such thing as a slight concussion. The effects may take days or weeks to manifest themselves. A recent example is Jason Bay of the

New York Mets who was unable to play out the season because of what at first was thought to be a slight concussion. Mohammed Ali's onset of Parkinson's disease is most likely connected to the number of concus-

sions he suffered in the ring."
Assemblyman Diegnan acknowledged all of those who helped draft this legislation including Barbara Geiger-Parker of the Brain Injury Association, Dr. Robb Rehberg of the Athletic Trainers Society, Dr. Steven Rice of the American Academy of Pediatrics and Dr. Jill Brooks.

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


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
