BOE Appoints Interim Asst. Superintendent

The Board of Education appointed Dr. Frank Cocchiola, Jr. as interim assistant superintendent of instruction and operations at the December 15 meeting.

Cocchiola began work on December 16 at a rate of \$575 per day. He replaces Dr. Lorraine Cella, who will leave the district on December 30 to take the position of Edgewater superintendent of schools.

A graduate of Seton Hall University, Cocchiola holds a B.S. degree in math and education, a master's degree in administration and supervision from Montclair State University and a doctorate in the same subject from Fordham University in New York

Cocchiola was a teacher and then an administrator in Wallington for 42 years, 20 of which were in the position of superintendent, where he oversaw two elementary schools and the junior-senior high school.

Cocchiola is currently an adjunct professor at both Felician and Caldwell colleges.

Children's Author Visits Grant School

Author Valerie Thomas visited Grant School students on December 13 as part of the new "Meet the Author" program. Thomas discussed her experience as a writer and read excerpts from Karma Bites, a book that she and co-author Stacy Kramer recently published.

The Meet the Author program is sponsored by the South Plainfield Cultural Arts Commission (SPCAC). The concept was initially discussed by longtime SPCAC board members, Audrey and Ken Reisch. The Reisches, who are literacy volunteers, wanted to provide a decisive way to engage students with the written word.

In the fall, the new district-wide

In the fall, the new district-wide writing curriculum, *Being a Writer*, was implemented, and it became a reality for Grant School students after SPCAC board members and Grant School Principal Leo Whalen developed the two-part program.

During the first visit, the author introduces him or herself and reads from his or her book; the next month the author returns to sign the books that were donated to each student who pledged to read the book in its entirety.

In two separate sessions, Thomas spoke to fifth, and then to sixth, graders. She discussed with the classes how she became a writer after majoring in the classics—Latin and Ancient Greek—at Reed College in Oregon.

"I didn't know what I wanted to do when I was growing up. Some people know what they want to do, but I didn't," Thomas said.

Deciding to move to Europe right after college, Thomas took jobs as a waitress and a cook, and she sold t-shirts. In Germany she started her own brownie business. After a few years of living in Europe, she returned to the United States and moved to New York City where she only knew one person. That friend helped her make a connection which set Thomas on a career path as an editorial assistant to a film director in a movie production company where she worked with writers who wrote screenplays.

"For 10 years I was reading a lot of scripts, and at the same time working with the people who wrote movie scripts," she said. "I worked on the films, The Avenger Part 3, a really horrible movie—and later on The Silence of the Lambs. Then I left to write my own script. It was sold to 20th Century Fox, but never made

into a movie.'

Thomas began to think of writing a book after her daughter was born. "I wanted to write a book she could read one day, but not a picture book," she explained.

Karma Bites was published in August of 2010. The humorous story is about a young girl named Franny, who survives the year she started seventh grade with two best friends who can't stand each other, parents who are divorcing, twin eight-year-old brothers who are difficult to live with and a hippie grandmother who

gives her a large box of recipes that may fix her problems, but warns her not to use them. "Franny is about to learn that magic and karma aren't to be played with. When you mess with the universe, it can bite back in unexpected ways," according to a book review on amazon.com.

Thomas also said that the Disney

Thomas also said that the Disney TV Channel is considering the book for a TV movie. She also is writing another young adult novel that will be published next year.

BOE Awarded Grant for Safety/Security Improvements

The New Jersey School Boards Association Insurance Group (NJSBAIG) warded the Board of Education (BOE) a safety grant in the amount of \$35,506.

The grant rewards the BOE for its commitment to risk management and will be used to invest in further safety and security-related improvements within the district.

The school district applied for the grant funding in the summer of 2010 and was recently notified that their application had been approved.

Nicholas Puleio, interim business administrator/board secretary, was in attendance and accepted the grant check on behalf of the BOE. He announced that the grant money will be used to fund security upgrades at Grant School and possible enhancements to other locations.

In keeping with its mission to protect New Jersey schools and keep district dollars in the classroom, NJSBAIG established the Safety Grant program to help public schools purchase safety and security related items that ever tightening school budgets may not have allowed for. The grant program provides funding that schools otherwise may not have, to invest in safety and security-related projects that will make their schools safer for students, employees and the communities they serve

In total, in 2010 NJSBAIG is awarding \$5M in safety grants to public school districts across the state.

The NJSBAIG, located in Burlington, is a non-profit entity providing property, casualty and workers' compensation insurance at competitive rates to NJ public schools. It is the only state wide, member-owned school district insurance fund. 

Same Job, New Title for Retired Det. James Darby

Retired South Plainfield Police Detective James Darby was appointed residency investigator/school security employee by the Board of Education at the December 15 meeting. The responsibilities of the job are to investigate and monitor pupils attending or seeking to attend district schools, and to patrol school facilities and grounds (mostly at the high school) to "prevent disruptive or illegal actions, access to restricted areas, theft and vandalism and to ensure the safety and security of school students and staff," according to the job description.

The job is almost the same as the

position he held before he retired from the police force during the 2009/2010 school year. That position, School Resource Officer, was created as a shared service between the BOE and the Borough of South Plainfield with both entities splitting the salary and benefits costs. When the 2010/2011 school budget was defeated in April, the position of resource officer was one of the first positions eliminated by the BOE.

Darby, a decorated officer, retired from the police force in June after 25 years of service (16 in South Plainfield). He subsequently expressed a desire to continue working for the BOE, patrolling the high school grounds and buildings and checking out the residency of students whose parents were difficult to contact.

On October 27, the BOE re-hired

Darby as full-time residency officer at a salary of \$42,000. At the December 15 meeting, the board officially cancelled the position of residency officer and officially appointed Darby to the position of residency investigator/ school security employee.

Darby no longer wears a uniform nor carries a gun, and patrols the halls and grounds of the high school and middle school in street clothes.

"But the kids know who I am," he explained. "And for the most part, they keep their distance," except those he knows from coaching baseball.

Darby says he is busy in his job. "We have had eight students transferred out of the district, resulting in a savings of \$87,000 in tuition," he said.

On December 12, 1985, 248 servicemen and women of the U.S. Army's 101st Airborne Division lost their lives when their plane crashed in Gander, Newfoundland. McCriskin II were followed by Amazing Grace performed on bagpipes. The crowd was hushed as SPHS student Alyssa Aiello stepped forward with her trumpet to play Taps. Closing remarks were made by Rev. Charles Mingle.

The South Plainfield Eagles Midget Cheerleaders gathered around the



base of the tree to flip the switches that would light the tree decorated with thousands of lights. Shortly after Santa Claus and his friend, Frosty the Snowman, arrived on a fire truck. As the crowd made their way to the final destination, they sang Christmas carols and then arrived at Flanagan's Restaurant and Pub for refreshments.

The remaining original members of the U.S. Army 101st Airborne Division General McAuliffe NY/NJ were not in attendance at the tree lighting, but arrived earlier in the day to honor their fallen comrades. The honor guard laid a wreath beside the tree.
