

Democrats Announce Three Candidates for Borough Council

Incumbent Councilwoman Chrissy Buteas, John Sorrentino and Paul Mc-Cullen have won the backing of the local party as the Democratic candidates for South Plainfield Borough Council. All three candidates have deep roots in the community. Buteas and McCullen are lifelong residents and Sorrentino has resided in the borough for over 25 years.

Democratic Chair Mike English said, "These three candidates bring a wealth of experience from their professional backgrounds and the knowledge that comes from years of volunteering in the community. Collectively, they bring decades of experi-

ence and a strong commitment to serve the people of their hometown. They understand what the people need and they have the passion to deliver."

The candidates are running on a platform of fiscal responsibility, open government and a commitment to providing the best quality of life for South Plainfield residents. "Our nation was founded on the ideals of representative democracy and a system of checks and balances," added English. "The two-party system invites essential debate, provides critical oversight, and protects against the inevitable nature of absolute power leading to (Continued on page 21)

Estimated Third Quarter Tax Bills Reflects Increase

Businesses and residents will receive estimated tax bills for the third quarter of this year, because the borough's 2011 budget has yet to be approved by the state and formally adopted by the council.

According to CFO Glenn Cullen, taxpayers will see an increase in all areas. The county tax, which includes a tax contribution to the Open Space Trust Fund, and the school budgets have both been finalized. Therefore, the new county and open space tax will be \$124.23 and the school board tax is \$111.93 a year based on an average home assessed at \$123,000.

At its introduction, the 2011 municipal budget had included \$750,000 from the library surplus of \$2M as tax relief which would have resulted in a flat municipal tax. The council had anticipated the \$750,000 from the library surplus after Gov. Chris Christie signed a bill last October which stated that independent libraries must transfer surplus funds above 20% back to the town where they are located. After an audit performed by the Library Board, approximately \$148,000 was transferred back for tax relief, but it was not included in the 2011 borough budget submitted to the state, which includes a \$59.04 a year increase for property owners. where library boards do not cooperate.

"The municipal tax is an estimate for the calendar year and the final number may be less since the budget is still a work in progress," commented Council President and Finance Committee Chairman Ray Rusnak. "It is important for us to get the third quarter bills out in order to meet the

financial obligations of the borough. The municipal budget of 2011 is extremely streamlined and is actually less than the 2010 budget. Our biggest obstacle is overcoming our decreasing revenue stream."

Cullen also stated that the borough sold some short term notes last week at a half a percent so the budget should contain further reductions

Barclay's Golf Tournament Will Cause Traffic Delays

South Plainfield motorists will experience traffic delays and road closings during the week of August 22-28 when the Barclay's PGA Golf Tournament will be held at Plainfield Country Club. South Plainfield officials have been meeting regularly with Edison officials in recent months to coordinate a plan to accommodate the golf pros, spectators and celebrities anticipated to arrive for the huge event.

In addition to the 1,500 volunteers who will work that week, approximately 10,000 spectators are expected on Tuesday and Wednesday to watch the golf pros practice, and about 25,000 to 30,000 are anticipated to arrive each day of play, Thursday through Sunday. Monday, Aug. 29 has been designated to the state of the s

nated as a rain day and VIP golf day, so traffic and road closures will remain in effect that day.

Most spectators will park at designated lots at JP Stevens High School, in Edison, Clark, Scotch Plains and Woodbridge and will be bussed to the country club; however, police expect that many spectators will drive through South Plainfield to park near the golf course. Negotiations are still taking place to use South Plainfield High and Kennedy School parking lots.

To help move traffic in the area of the golf course, police will implement a special traffic plan. The council has already passed three resolutions. From 12:01 a.m. Monday, Aug. 22 to 11:59 p.m. (Continued on page 21)

Cornell-Dubilier Cleanup Winds Down

After more than 13 years since the time the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) added the Cornell-Dubilier Electronics (CDE) manufacturing site to its National Priorities List, the cleanup at the site is winding down and should be complete by early next year. Expectations are high that once the property is returned to its owners a redevelopment plan will be formulated that will benefit the residents of South Plainfield and satisfy the recommendations of the EPA for redeveloping former Superfund properties.

The first phase of the cleanup at the CDE Superfund site began in 2007 with the demolition of approximately 18 buildings that were used during the company's operations from 1936-1962. Once the demolition was completed in May of 2008, the next phase of the project included excavation of buried debris (the capacitor disposal area) that was begun in February 2008 and completed in June of that same year.

The contaminated soil was then

treated on site by low temperature thermal desorption (LTTD). This process involved separating the contaminants from the soil via a conveyor belt system that moved the soil to an enclosed chamber, then heating the material to temperatures of 800 degrees or more. The soil was then retested and if acceptable, returned to the site as backfill. If the soil did not meet EPA specifications, it was retreated in the LTTD unit. If the soil was still unacceptable, it was trucked off-site for incineration along with the contaminates that were removed from the soil. These included discarded capacitor parts that contained polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs) and other hazardous materials known to

cause cancer. "We are doing soil sampling on some right-of-ways and residential properties now and we have completed the work using the LTTD unit," said Pat Seppi, community involvement coordinator for the US EPA Region 2. Seppi also stated that the site has a new project manager, Diego Garcia, who has "done a great job getting up to speed and moving the project forward."

According to Seppi, approximately 98,000 tons of contaminated material was excavated and remediated on-site, at which time the LTTD treatment facility was dismantled. Any additional contaminated material found will be excavated and sent off-site to permitted landfills. The EPA expects to complete this work in early 2012.

In addition, testing of groundwater at the site is on-going. "A remedial investigation/feasibility study to define the nature and extent of groundwater contamination at the site is on-going and is planned to be completed within the next year," Seppi said. "With the completion of those studies, the agency will select a remedy for the groundwater. That process includes public outreach by the agency, so that the community has an opportunity to hear and comment on the EPA's planned remedy before we select it."

At this time, the EPA is unclear on how far the contamination extends. "[The] EPA believes the sampling will help us answer this question," said Seppi. A separate remedy will be selected by the EPA, probably by 2013.





GOP Urges Library Board to Release Funds for Tax Relief

Borough Republicans this week called upon the Library Board of Trustees not to stand in the way of meaningful property tax relief for residents. The call came after the Borough Council unanimously supported a plan presented by Councilman Rob Bengivenga to move the library to a larger facility in the Walgreens shopping center located between South Plainfield and Oak Tree avenues

According to Bengivenga, this plan would nearly double the library's size, and at the same time, allow the library board to return surplus funds to taxpayers.

"It's a win-win," said Bengivenga. "The Library Board has about \$2M in extra money sitting in the bank. That money came from taxpayers, and a substantial part of it should go back to

Mayor Matt Anesh agreed: "Councilman Bengivenga's plan is the right answer for the town. We all agree the library is too small, but residents have said they don't want to borrow millions to build a new one, especially when libraries are in a state of transition."

Anesh said leasing space for a new library makes sense. "It gives us time to see how technology like downloadable books and movies will change things.

With technology changing, libraries will likely become more compact."

"We hope the Library Board recognizes the importance of meaningful tax relief," added Councilman Tim McConville. "So far they've refused

"The council is working hard to hold down costs and control taxes," said McConville. "The Library Board has a huge surplus just sitting there, and it has a responsibility to return a substantial part of that money to overtaxed residents.

"Unfortunately, the council cannot force the Library Board to return the money," added Anesh. In addition, the board is still controlled by the prior Democrat administration's appointees, who lead the effort to reject our new appointees proposal to return \$750,000 to residents for tax relief.

Bengivenga hopes that with the introduction of his plan, the board will reconsider its position.

"New Jersey has the highest property taxes in the country, and the recession is hurting families everywhere. The Library Board should not be standing in the way of tax relief. It's time for everyone to work together."



Composting yard waste and food scraps benefits our soil and plants, helps the environment by reducing the amount of garbage going to the landfill, and saves money on fertilizer and other soil amendments.

According to compostguide.com, "about one third of the space in landfills is taken up with organic waste from our yards and kitchens, just the type of material that can be used in compost." Why throw it away when it units available to Middlesex County can become a money saver and cheap source of fertilizer for the garden?

A compost pile consists of four basic ingredients which will enrich the garden: nitrogen, carbon, water and air.

on Monday, Aug. 29, Woodland Avenue will be closed to regular traffic from Oak Tree Road to Maple Avenue. The road will be designated as a one way street to accommodate buses. Residents who reside along that road will be issued special passes so they can access their residences. The following streets that abut Woodland Avenue will also be closed: Francesca Court, East Fairview Avenue, East Crescent Parkway, East Hendricks Boulevard, Wexler Place, Fairmount Avenue and East Golf Avenue.

All streets and roads bounded by Sprague Avenue to the north, Park Avenue to the west, Oak Tree Road to the south and Woodland Avenue to the east shall be designated so that parking will not be allowed on the north and east boundaries of all streets and roads. No parking signs will be posted on these streets by the borough in advance of the start of the tournament.

During the entire tournament, police will be utilizing seven message boards around town to remind motorists of the road closures, detours and to designate where parking is prohibited. The West Nine Golf Course will be closed and used by the golf pros for practice. Woodland Avenue traffic will be diverted along Park Avenue from Oak Tree Road to Plainfield.

Residents are reminded that if they are considering the sale of water, hot dogs or any other refreshment, they must obtain a permit from the health department. If any resident is intending to charge spectators to park on their property, they should be aware that there is an ordinance which prohibits autos from parking on lawns. Residents can use their driveways to park cars, but not lawns. According to Police Chief James Parker, these laws will be strictly enforced during the week.

Approximately 20 extra South Plainfield police officers will be on duty daily the week of the tournament. The Barclays Tournament has already agreed to reimburse South Plainfield for all costs incurred during the week, which is estimated at approximately \$100,000. The borough will also utilize CERTS volunteers during the week.

in expenses this year. Mayor Matt Anesh said that the council is "always looking to make further cuts."

"I expect the final borough figure to be in the \$40 per household range based upon the recent note sale and some other items that have recently come up," said Cullen. "If the library was willing to work with the governing body on the surplus issue, municipal taxes would have decreased again about \$15 per household."

At the June 30 council meeting, Democratic Councilwoman Chrissy

Buteas voted against sending out estimated third quarter tax bills, but voted in favor of paying the bills. Councilman Rob Bengivenga questioned her as to how expenses will be covered by the borough if she does not agree with sending out tax bills.

"Based on the information regarding the increase, I reserve the right to change my vote when the budget is voted upon," said Buteas. "I know that the Finance Committee worked hard on this budget, but I believe they put all their eggs in one basket. The Republican Majority just assumed,

without initially discussing their plan with the library trustees, they would receive money from the library; they failed to look at other areas of the budget that could be reduced. I offered a number of ideas to reduce the budget which would not rely on one time revenue gimmicks. Each of these could have netted substantial benefits to the borough. Unfortunately due to the inaction by the Republican Majority, we are now seeing an increase in our taxes," Buteas added.

absolute corruption. And as the only female, Buteas brings a voice of a demographic woefully under-represented."

Concerned about decreasing revenues and financial sustainability, the Democratic candidates say that the current budget crafted by the Republican majority relied on onetime-gimmicks that can not be repeated. The Democrats propose an economic summit to develop a realistic financial plan to face the problems of the future. "We can't continue to rely on raiding library funds and selling off property to support basic maintenance," said Buteas. "We need to have a discussion as a community to understand where we are and how we move forward together."

Councilwoman Chrissy Buteas is the council liaison to the Environmental Commission and Health Advisory Board. She has also served as liaison to the Parade Committee, Recreation Commission and the Cultural Arts Commission. She has been a member of the Parade Committee for the past seven years and is also a member of the South Plainfield Suburban Woman's Club, the Booster Club, the Green Team and the borough's 9/11 Ceremony Committee. Buteas is also the vice president of the Women's Political Caucus of New Jersey, a state-wide organization dedicated to electing women to public office.

John Sorrentino has been a member of the South Plainfield Parade Committee for 16 years. In his role as the committee chair for the last nine years, he is responsible for the planning and coordination of the entire Labor Day parade. Sorrentino also enjoys the recreational opportunities the borough offers him and his family. He has coached his children and their teammates in the Ponytail League, Little League and the Pop Warner football program.





Nancy Donahue Retires After 41 Years

Nancy Donahue has been teaching for 41 years in the fifth grade classroom and during that time she has emphasized displaying the work of her students.

"I always make the classroom child centered. They love when you recognize them and recognize their achievements. I wanted them to know it was their room and out in the hall I make displays," said Donahue.

An annual display in social studies emphasized the diversity of the United States with each student choosing one state out of the 50 and demonstrating through various items the physical and economic features of that state.

"I've been known to do all sorts of things. For instance, when I did the Westward movement Pd have them dancing and singing because the pioneers did that," she added.

After she graduated from Newark State College (now Kean University) Donahue worked for a year for the North Plainfield School District as a sixth grade teacher. In 1997, she began working at Franklin School, then moved to Grant School nine years ago when all the fifth and sixth grades in the district merged to form an intermediate/elementary school.

When James Doggett, the first Grant School principal, retired, Donahue was on the interview committee that selected Leo Whalen as principal.

"Right from the beginning I knew that Mrs. Donahue was someone I could count on whenever I needed help around the school," Whalen said. "She would always volunteer to work on committees in the school: Cultural Arts, Leadership, PTO and most recently, the School Improvement Team. When parents talk to me about Mrs. Donahue and her class the theme is always the same: It's about how much their child likes Mrs. Donahue and how they like to be in her class," added Whalen, noting Donahue was selected teacher of the year twice and also was a mentor to many student teachers.

"The principals I've had have offered such wonderful guidance to me, that's why I want to mentor new teachers. It's a passion of mine. It's my way of giving back," said Donahue.

"She's had at least one student teacher a year, sometimes two, even three," observed fellow Grant teacher Kathryn Boyle, adding, "She's the last one to leave the building. She is always prepared. She is dedicated. The children love her."

"It makes me feel so good to know that I'm helping someone enter the field of teaching and make a smooth transition. Obviously being in a classroom in a college isn't the same experience as being in an elementary classroom. What I do basically is to help them [student teachers] through the rough spots and offer encouragement. We've had marvelous student teachers. I learned as much from my students including new techniques as they did from me. I loved every minute. They keep you on your toes," Donahue said.

After so many years at Grant, Donahue is planning to spend time taking trips with her husband. But she isn't forgetting Grant School and will return to Grant during the next school year as a substitute teacher.







While I realize plenty of other people have written to the paper about the Library Board's refusal to help the council provide tax relief for our residents, I recently learned some news that makes that board's decision even more troubling.

At a recent Library Board meeting, the board voted to give 3% raises to board employees, including its director, who makes about \$100,000. Like all our borough employees, the library employees work hard and do a great job for our residents. But at a time when other borough employees are getting raises in the one- and two-percent range, I can't understand what the Library Board was thinking.

Back in March the council negotiated a new contract with the PBA. Our police officers, realizing the hard economic times, agreed to 1.9% increases. On top of this, they agreed to concessions on healthcare, starting salaries and longevity. In fact, South Plainfield became only the second town in the county where longevity is being phased out and eliminated.

At a time when the Library Board is refusing to help the council provide meaningful tax relief, it is inconceivable that the same board would dole out raises that are higher than those the other public employees in town are getting.

I hope the board's actions are not partisan, but I'm beginning to get the impression that the board, which is still controlled by Democrat supporters, is doing everything it can to thwart the efforts of the new administration. I hope I'm wrong, but it's getting to the point that the board's decisions leave me with no other conclusion.

Whether it's partisan politics or narrow parochial interests, the board's decisions don't serve the best interests of the taxpayers. It's time for the Library Board to do what's best for the entire community.


