Ashnault Places Second at Pan Am Cadet Championships

South Plainfield High School junior Anthony Ashnault recently represented the United States at the Pan American Cadet Championships in Campeche, Mexico. FILA Cadets are athletes who are 15-17 years old and include many of the nation's top high school wrestlers.

Anthony was chosen as one of 10 wrestlers to represent the United States on the freestyle team and compete at the 58kg (127.7 lbs) weight class. He was the only New Jersey athlete on Team U.S.A.'s roster.

At the Pan Am Championships, Anthony pinned his first opponent from Mexico and tech falled his second opponent from Puerto Rico. In his final match against Wilfredo

In preparation for this level of international competition, Anthony spent most of his summer competing at various national tournaments as a member of New Jersey's National Team. In Fargo, Anthony earned All-American status, placing third in the Freestyle Division and fourth in the Greco-Roman Division.

Three Parade Grand Marshals To Represent Our Local Heroes

Veterans Joseph Belardo, Trista Moretti and Michael Santoro have been chosen as Grand Marshals of the 54th annual Labor Day Parade themed "Honoring Our Heroes" on Monday, Sept. 5.

Belardo has resided in the borough for nearly 60 years and has marched in the Labor Day Parade for the past

25 years with a service organization. He served in Vietnam from July 1967 through August 1968 and received a Bronze Star with Valor, four Purple Hearts, Army Presidential Unit Citation, Army Valorous Unit Award, Army Meritorious Unit Commendation, Navy (Marine) Presidential Unit Citation, Navy (Marine) Meritorious Unit Commendation, Marine Combat Action Ribbon, The Republic of Vietnam Cross of Gallantry with Palm and The Republic of Vietnam Civil Action Medal. Upon returning to the states, he received the State of New Jersey's Distinguished Service Medal and the state's Vietnam Service Recognition Medal. Belardo was also inducted into the Order of the Four Chaplains and the South Plainfield High School Hall of Fame.

While at home, Belardo joined various organizations including the Dusters, Quads and Searchlights Association, Purple Hearts, Vietnam Veterans of America (VVA), Veterans of Foreign Wars, American Legion and Disabled American Veterans. He is a past trustee of the N.J. Vietnam Memorial and Education Foundation where he also served on the committee to build the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Holmdel. He was commander

of the VVA and assisted with Mission of Honor which helps bring the remains of soldiers killed in Vietnam home to the U.S. for a proper burial. Belardo assisted in forming Operation Goldstar that sends Vietnam Era mothers of fallen soldiers to Vietnam to visit the place they were killed to obtain closure. The cost is paid for by the Dusters, Quads and Searchlights Organization of which he is a member and past president.

Belardo was an original member of the Victims of Agent Orange and was instrumental in helping to have Agent Orange identified as a harmful substance thereby helping affected soldiers receive compensation for being exposed.

For the past 25 years, Belardo has volunteered his time presenting educational Vietnam slide shows to high school and college students in New Jersey. He was also a keynore speaker at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, the Woman's Vietnam Memorial in Washington, D.C. and many other New Jersey events. He participates annually in the Marine Corps Toys for Tots program, and helps wounded WWII veterans in Menlo Park with

The 8U South Plainfield Dynamite All Star Baseball Team competed in the Madison Park Summer Slam Tournament. During the preliminary round of the tournament, Dynamite played South Amboy, Midtown Edison and Madison Park. The Dynamite dominated its competition by allowing only three runs in three games.

They beat South Amboy 13-0, Midtown 11-1 and Madison Park 12-2 to become the number one seed heading into the semi-final game against Sayre Wood South.

The semifinals were close throughout the whole game. The score was tied 1-1 heading into the top of the fifth inning when Sayre Wood South errupted for five runs going ahead 6-1 into the bottom of the fifth. As always, the never-say-die Dynamite exploded for five runs in the bottom of the fifth inning tying the game at 6-6. In that inning, Nick Loniewski led off with a double, Kenny Clevenger and Jaden Crudup walked and Anthony White singled in a couple of runs. Brandon Shine then knocked in a couple more runs. Jake Jones was hit by a pitch and Darren Ochoa singled in the tying run. With key plays made by Troy O'Connor, Clevenger and Crudup, the Dynamite defense did not allow any runs in the top of the sixth inning. In the bottom of the sixth, Johnny Padovano led off with a single and then stole second. Alfred Pace hit a monster shot, one hop to the fence which scored the winning run for the Dynamite and sent them into the finals. Shine, Mitchell Dudak and Ochoa pitched a great game, striking out many and walking few.

To the Editor:

As a group we try to keep abreast and monitor activities in our community. In a letter to the Observer back in September 2009, we outlined the School District Capital Outlay Program. We continue to review these proposed projects.

At that time the school district planned a capital outlay of \$5,515,000. Of this total, \$3,475,000 was to come from the Capital Reserve Account. This money was available because the 2008 school district audit showed the district withheld from you, the taxpayer, \$4,406,756 in excess of the school budget needs that year. This was your money. We were also told that the state would reimburse 40% of eligible costs for the projects.

The projects were completed in 2009 and 2010. The costs were approximately \$3,347,658. The projects came in below estimates because the bids were lower and very competitive. Unfortunately, requests for the states' 40% and related documentation to receive these funds apparently was not processed until June 2011. This share in dollars was to be 40% of \$3,347,658, or \$1,337,047.

Recently the state awarded \$465,000 with, hopefully, \$874,047 to come. If this becomes a reality the impact to our Capital Reserve Account of \$3,475,000 would be \$2,135,953, leaving a capital reserve balance of \$1,339,047. This is really your tax dollars that we feel should be returned to you in the form of

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
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Holy Savior Academy Announces Board of Trustees

Bourbeau's Adopt Tompkins and Maltby

Mary Ann Bourbeau has renewed her Adopt-A-Spot agreement with the South Plainfield Clean Business Association for the next two years. She and her family have been maintaining the stream crossing at Tompkins and Maltby avenues since 2009. They will be doing quarterly cleanups of the roadside, storm drains, stream corridor and surrounding open space.

The stream runs through neighborhood backyards and wooded, vacant land from the Plainfield border past Baker Avenue and Tooz Place. It is piped underground, joins with another stream and surfaces in Walnut Street Park. These streams were neglected for years. Recently, area residents have joined forces to clean them up and restore native vegetation and flow. In June, the Environmental Commission provided 100 tree saplings that were planted along the stream between Tompkins and Baker. The Bourbeaus' work upstream assists in the restoration effort by removing litter before it can wash into the stream corridor.

Bourbeau and her daughter starred in the Clean Communities presentation "Litter, Where Does it Come From, Where Does it Go?" produced by Dave Street. The Glitterbug Club project used local talent to create a PowerPoint anti-littering message.



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

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Barclays PGA Golf Tournament in Two Weeks

In just two weeks, the Barclay's PGA Golf Tournament will be underway at the Plainfield Country Club in Edison (Monday, Aug. 22-29). Residents and businesses in that area need to be aware of the traffic patterns planned for that week. South Plainfield officials continue to meet with Edison officials to coordinate plans for the huge event; however, traffic plans are subject to change prior to the tournament.

Woodland Avenue will be closed to regular traffic from Oak Tree Road to Maple Avenue and designated as a one way street to accommodate buses. Residents who reside along that road will be issued special passes so they are able to access their residences. Side roads that access Woodland Avenue along that one way route will be barricaded. They include Delores Parkway, East Fairview, East Crescent Parkway and Francesca Court. Woodland Avenue north of Maple Avenue, previously scheduled to be closed to traffic but open one way to buses, will now remain open to twoway traffic. Streets in that area that will have access to Woodland Avenue and include Sprague, East Golf and Fairmount avenues, Wexler Place and East Hendricks Boulevard.

In addition to the 1,800 volunteers who will be working that week, approximately 10,000 spectators are expected on Tiuesday and Wednesday and about 25,000 to 30,000 on Thursday through Sunday. Monday, Aug. 29 has been designated as a rain day and VIP golf day, so traffic and road closures will remain in effect.

Most spectators will be bussed from designated parking lots at JP Stevens High School in Edison, Clark, Scotch Plains and Woodbridge; however, police expect that many spectators will drive through South Plainfield to park near the golf course. Negotiations are still taking place to use South Plainfield High and Kennedy School parking lots.

All streets and roads bounded by Sprague Avenue to the north, Park Avenue to the west, Oak Tree Road to the south and Woodland Avenue to the east will allow parking on only one side of the street. No parking signs will be posted on these streets in advance of the tournament.

During the entire tournament, police plan to utilize seven message boards around town to remind motorists of the road closures, detours and to designate where parking is prohibited. The West Nine Golf Course will be closed and used by the golf pros for practice. Woodland Avenue traffic will be diverted along Park Avenue from Oak Tree Road to Plainfield.

Also, any resident who may be considering selling hot dogs or any prepared food should be aware it is not permitted. Our previous story report-

ed that they would need a permit, but according to the heath department, no permits will be issued. If a resident intends to charge spectators to park on their property, be aware that there is an ordinance which prohibits autos from parking on lawns. Residents can use their driveways to park cars, but not their lawns. According to Police Chief James Parker, these laws will be strictly enforced during the week.

Approximately 20 extra South Plainfield police officers will be on duty daily the week of the tournament. The Barclays Tournament has already agreed to reimburse South Plainfield for all costs incurred during the week, which is estimated at approximately \$100,000. The borough will also utilize CERTS volunteers during the week.

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

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



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Tiger Sharks Attack Blue Dolphins

Five Tax Scams to Avoid

Hiding income offshore, identity theft client's refund or charging inflated fees and return preparer fraud topped the IRS's list of tax scams in 2011. The Internal Revenue Service issues an too good to be true. To increase conannual list of the top 12 tax scams, known as the "Dirty Dozen." These scams are illegal and can lead to significant penalties and interest and possible criminal prosecution.

Here are five year-round scams every taxpayer should know about.

1. Hiding Income Offshore. The IRS aggressively pursues taxpayers involved in abusive offshore transactions and the promoters who facilitate or enable these schemes. Taxpayers have offshore debit cards, credit cards, wire transfers, foreign trusts, employeeleasing schemes, private annuities or life insurance plans.

In February, the IRS announced a second voluntary disclosure initiative to bring offshore money back into the U.S. tax system. The new voluntary disclosure initiative will be available through August 31.

2. Phishing Scam artists use phishing to trick unsuspecting victims into revealing personal or financial information. Scams take the form of e-mails, phony websites or phone calls that offer a fictitious refund or threaten an audit or investigation to lure victims into revealing personal information. The IRS never initiates unsolicited e-mail contact with taxpayers about their tax issues. Phishers use the information to steal the victim's identity, access their bank accounts and credit cards or apply for loans. Please forward suspicious scams to the IRS at phishing@irs.gov. You can also visit www.irs.gov, keyword phishing, for additional information.

3. Return Preparer Fraud. Dishonest tax return preparers cause trouble for taxpayers by skimming a portion of the

for tax preparation. They attract new clients by promising refunds that are fidence in the tax system, the IRS now requires all paid return preparers to register with the IRS, pass competency tests and attend continuing education. Taxpayers can report suspected return preparer fraud to the IRS on Form 3949-A, Informational Referral.

4. Filing False or Misleading Forms. The IRS continues to see false or fraudulent tax returns filed to obtain improper tax refunds.

Scammers often use information tried to avoid or evade U.S. income from family or friends to file false tax by hiding income in offshore banks or fraudulent returns, so beware of and brokerage accounts, or by using requests for such data. Don't claim deductions or credits you are not entitled to and never willingly allow others to use your information to file false returns. If you participate in such schemes, you could be liable for financial penalties or even face criminal prosecution. The IRS takes refund fraud seriously, has programs to aggressively combat it and stops the vast majority of incorrect refunds.

5. Frivolous Arguments. Promoters of frivolous schemes encourage people to make unreasonable and outlandish claims to avoid paying the taxes they owe. If a scheme seems too good to be true, it probably is. The IRS has a list of frivolous legal positions that taxpayers should avoid on www.irs.gov. These arguments are false and have been thrown out of court repeatedly.

their daily activities.

In 2010, Belardo published a memoir of his time in Vietnam entitled, Dusterman: Vietnam, which has sold over 500 copies and will be featured in an upcoming issue of Vietnam Magazine.

Belardo is married to Nancy (Painton) and has three children, Joseph, Patrick and Mary, and four grandchildren. He is the founder of Support System, a custom metal fabrication company in Whitehouse. Belardo coached recreation soccer and basketball in the community for several years and was a member of the Music Boosters at the high school.

Sgt. Trista Moretti lived in the borough her entire life and attended South Plainfield High School where she was a member of the 1997 championship field hockey team. She attended Middlesex County College and William Paterson University studying child development. After college she joined the military in 2003. After basic training at Fort Leonard Wood in Missouri, AIT and airborne school Moretti was assigned to the Medina Regional Security Operations Center in Texas where she concentrated on developing cryptology skills.

In December 2005, Sgt. Moretti was assigned to the 425th Brigade Special Troop Battalion of the 25th Infantry Division, gathering and protecting critical information. The following year she was deployed to Forward Operating Base Kalso near Sunni Triangle in Iraq. Sgt. Moretti and her fellow soldiers were instrumental in locating and destroying countless road bombs saving many fellow soldiers lives.

On June 25, 2007, Sgt. Moretti's life ended when a mortar struck her sleeping quarters after she had completed her shift and was preparing for a mission the following day. At 27 years of age, she was posthumously awarded the Bronze Star, Purple Heart and the

Combat Action Badge.

Sgt. Moretti has been memorialized throughout the borough including her high school locker which contains her field hockey jacket and stick and a marker and flag pole at Franklin School. A street was also dedicated in her name. Sgt. Moretti has dedications at the National Security Agency in Arizona with the most recent one in San Antonio, Texas where the Trista Moretti Complex now stands.

Michael Santoro was a lifelong resident of the borough who passed away on July 25 at the age of 91. He graduated from North Plainfield High School in 1936. He was a Boy Scout during the Great Depression Era and went on to enlist in the U.S. Marine Corps after graduation. Santoro served in the 1st Marine B.N. 11th Regiment, 1st Marine Division, Fleet Marine Force. He was assigned to Guantanomo and upon returning to the U.S. helped build Camp New River from scrap, which is known today as Camp

When the U.S. entered into WWII, Santoro was deployed to the Southwest Pacific where, for the first time, the 1st Marine Division defeated the Japanese Imperial Army. He was promoted to platoon Sergeant and spent time in Australia and New Guinea before returning to the states in 1944.

After his tour of duty, Santoro was assigned to Quantico, Va. as a gunnery instructor at the U.S. Marine Corps Combat School. He went on to become a chief ordinanceman and returned to Japan at the end of the war as a replacement in the Fleet Marine

Santoro received numerous medals and honors for his service which include the American Theatre, American Defense Medal, Presidential Unit Citation with Star, Organized Reserve Medal, Navy Unit Citation with Star, Navy Combat Ribbon, Pacific Theatre Medal with three stars, Good Conduct medal and N.J. Distinguished Medal. He received a Letter of Commendation from General Holland Smith and was awarded a medal by the people of Solomon Island on the 50th anniversary of Guadalcanal.

After his honorable discharge in 1945, Santoro returned to the borough and worked as a postal carrier for the U.S. Postal Service for 36 years. He volunteered his time as a junior vice commander of the American Legion, service officer for the N.J. Chapter of the 1st Marine Division, service officer of the VFW, member of the Veterans Street Naming Committee, chaplain for the 1st Marine Division, N.J., chaplain American Vets Lyons Hospital the Joe Klapper Chapter, secretary of the 1st Marine Division N.J. Chapter, VA Medical Center, life member and past president of the National Association of Letter Carriers #3651, life member of the Marine Corps League, Guadal Canal Veterans Asso., South Plainfield AARP, National Association of Retired Federal Employees, life member of Disabled American Veterans, AMVETS of Lyons Hospital, Sacred Heart Caring & Sharing Committee and AARP volunteer at the recycling center.

Santoro received honors for his volunteerism including the Lifetime Achievement Award, 2005 from the 1st Marine Division Association, Marine of the Year in 1992, Veterans Administration Award, Postmaster General Certification of Appreciation, Legion of Honor Award and received letters of recognition from Presidents Clinton and Bush and the Veterans Administration.
