# Borough Deluged By Hurricane Flood Rains

Hurricane Irene passed through South Plainfield Saturday night and caused power outages, neighborhood floods, road closures, flooded basements and many downed trees throughout the borough. The most dangerous part of the storm damage were the fallen trees which took down


live wires with them.

There were no reported injuries during the storm, which may be attributed to the preparations residents took prior to the storm's arrival. Residents and businesses began receiving automatically generated calls from Emergency Management personnel starting on Thursday, and the calls continued until after the storm passed. The messages advised people the oncoming storm and what to do to prepare for the high winds and rain. Thousands of sand bags were handed out at the Department of Public Works building on Friday and Saturday. At times the lines were so long they extended to Metuchen Road and beyond.

Flooding was extensive throughout town. Roads that normally don't flood were under water most of Sunday and Monday, making it very difficult to get around town. People spent most of Sunday walking around with cameras to survey the damage due to high winds and heavy rain. Major flooding occurred along New Market Avenue, Plainfield Avenue in front of Borough Hall and Fred Allen Drive and the surrounding streets near the Bound Brook.

The water in Spring Lake overflowed its banks, flooding Plainfield Avenue, Monument Park and Borough Hall, completely surrounding the building and stranding it like an island. Borough hall was closed on Monday until noon due to the flooding. The building did not sustain any water damage with the exception of a small amount of water in the basement. (Continued on page 22)

# Buono, Diegnan and Barnes Announce Campaign Kickoff and Call to Action

# It's About Getting it Done

Pointing out how Mayor Anesh and the new GOP administration have worked to take the town in a new direction, Council candidates Alex Barletta, Derryck White and Dick Frank this week talked about their plans for an even better South Plainfield if elected in November.

"We know results count," said Barletta, who was appointed to the council in January. "That's why we're so proud the town is moving in the right direction. And it's even more important that we keep it going that

Barletta pointed to spending as an example of the type of results he thinks are making a difference. Spending went up for years under the Democrats. Yet spending is down for the second year in a row under the new administration. No other town in the area has a record like that."

White, whose children attend Riley School, agreed, "The council is working hard to control taxes and spending, which is important for families trying to make ends meet. I'll work just as hard if the voters give me that chance."

In 2010 the average homeowner saw the municipal part of the tax bill (the part controlled by the council) drop by \$178. Even after a small increase this year, the average resident will still be paying \$138 less than in 2009 under the Democrats.

Over two years, the municipal part of the tax bill is down 8.2%. By contrast, county taxes, which are controlled by the Democrats, are up

"People are struggling," explained Frank, who's seeking a one-year term on the council. "They can't afford the constant increases.

The three candidates also stressed

the importance of being in touch with the needs of residents. "We have to control spending, but we also need to maintain the services people rely on," said Barletta.


The trio pointed to a string of accomplishments under the new administration as examples of where they want to take the borough:


- · The council worked with the PBA on a new contract that phases out longevity, reduces starting salaries, and controls healthcare costs. A renegotiated public works contract reduced starting salaries by 30%.
- · The borough workforce is about 15% smaller, something the council accomplished without the major layoffs seen in nearby towns. While payroll costs are going up in other towns, they actually went down in South Plainfield this year.
- · Debt service is down based on reduced borrowing.
- The borough has a new, updated website that's costing taxpayers about a third of the costs for the old one.
- Residents no longer have to separate recyclables, even though the borough is paying less for recycling costs. This happened when the council for the first time bid out recycling.

"These are just examples of the smaller, more efficient government that is becoming the norm in South Plainfield," explained Barletta.

"Our goal is to continue to take the town in this direction," added Frank. "Give us the chance, and we'll do just that."

"We believe we have a lot to offer," added White. "We're not career politicians looking to build a resume or climb the ladder. We're your neighbors, people who want to work together and get the job done.'

# Local Social Network Garners National Participation

When Laura Mazro Matusz launched a Facebook (FB) page two weeks ago, she never dreamed that it would have 1,100 plus participants and over 3,100 entries in just a matter of days. The FB page is, "You know you're from \*SOUTH PLAINFIELD\* when...".

Laura says "I created this page a few hours after I had to go back to South Plainfield for a meeting I had there. As I drove through my "hometown," I had so many memories flooding back to me and I thought, "Hmmm, wouldn't it be nice to create a place for everyone else to hear, speak, share and remember their childhood memories?"

Laura, who now lives in Somerset County, succeeded with a simple title to a Facebook page. It may not qualify as spreading like a "virus" in today's internet lingo, but participation quickly grew. There are many people who grew up in South Plainfield who now live all over the country. Their memories of the good times they had in their neighborhoods, schools and within their families-have become a living record on this FB page. Some of the entries have the written flavor of an oral history of our town.

Lori Feick Zielinski, a SPHS grad, commented, "It has brought back so many fond memories, as I have lived here for over 51 years now! And I have made some new "friends" who saw my posts and said they knew me 51 years! Wonderful!"

Paul Howe, a SPHS 1964 grad, who had a career with the Department of Defense and traveled the world, now is retired and living in West Virginia. "I moved from the borough in 1964 and had only been back a few times over the decades. I miss the people and the memories." Howe continues, "It is fun to meet up with my childhood friends on this page and re-hash old times. Even going so far as creating bogus arguments about whose memory is correct about some of the events of our youth."

Some members of the group, like Frances A. Davis, who now, lives in Danville, California, is an alum of Sacred Heart School. The topic she started about the grade school resulted in 45 quick comments that covered four decades of personal reminisces about the school and faculty.





The South Plainfield Knights of Columbus built a very special project on August 13. Twelve members of the Knights of Columbus joined by six Squires built a 50 foot wheelchair ramp for a South Plainfield resident in town who has Cerebral Palsy. In late July the mother of NyBil Ghanem came to the Knights to see if we could help build a ramp as our. Squires had built two ramps for other elderly residents in town in the past. NyBil's mother let us know her son is 27 years old and she could no longer pick him up and carry him into their house and she needed the help of the Knights desperately.

Upon looking at the scope of the ramp, Past Grand Knight Bill Butrico realized it would be difficult for the Squires to build this ramp alone so he asked if our council could help. Over a two day period and in only about 14 hours, our council was able to construct the ramp for NyBil to use.

On August 12 the Squires and three Knights dug 12 holes for the concrete footings and built two of the deck landings. Then on August 13, starting at 8 a.m., 10 Knights and various Squires completely built the rest of the ramp in only eight hours. This was a total team effort to help a handicapped resident in town.

The Knights also covered the total

# View South Plainfield's Past at KC's Korner


Even though the buildings are gone and time has passed changing the face of South Plainfield, you can still enjoy a view into the past with a visit to KC's Korner.



# Kids Learn All About Money at Save, Share, Spend Library Program

Using authentic U.S. currency (dollars and coins), Joyce A. Signorile of Central Jersey Federal Credit Union introduced the concept of save, share, spend to 10 youngsters ages five to

12 years old at the South Plainfield Public Library on August 15.

Signorile initially handed out increasingly larger denominations of paper currency from a one dollar bill to a twenty dollar bill, including a rare two dollar note no longer being printed, for the children to examine and identify. Signorile cautioned about counterfeit bills. She demonstrated how to identify a legal bill from a counterfeit one by holding up the bill and showing the side of the portrait of the president up to a light to see a smaller fainter replica of the picture on the lower right corner

She also had the children plunge their hands into plastic containers containing coins covered by shredded paper. The object was to feel and then tell what denomination the coin was before looking at it.

Most of the youngsters present were familiar with coins which they collected in piggy banks to be used for something they wanted. Signorile asked the children what they wanted. While most of the children present spoke of small items they wanted-one girl said, "A car."

"You will be saving for a long time.

If it's put in a piggy bank it doesn't collect interest," Signorile noted. She suggested that money should be placed in a savings account.

Besides saving coins to spend, Signorile suggested a portion of the amount be directed to donating to charitable causes.

Signorile's theme, "Save, Share and Spend" was summarized by a graphic drawing of a circle which divided \$100 into three sections, \$10 for sharing such as a donation to \$45 for saving and \$45 for spending.

# Fall Season Updates for Football and Field Hockey Announced by NJSIAA

With the fall interscholastic sports season about to begin, the New Jersey State Interscholastic Association (NJSIAA)--the non-profit group that represents the best interests of more than 250,000 student athletes from 433 accredited public, private and parochial high schools-has announced a pair of significant updates. One deals with on-field, protective equipment, while the other focuses on exactly which playing sites will be used for championship competition.

Effective immediately, all field hockey players will be required to wear high-impact goggles (either plastic or metal mesh) while in a game. This rule change applies to all varsity, junior varsity and freshman level competition, and is in keeping with an April 2011 mandate by the National Federation of State High School Associations related to eyewear and field hockey competition.

Protective goggles are specifically designed to reduce the likelihood of a player being injured by the hard, heavy balls used in field hockey or by swinging sticks. Previously, the use of mouth guards by field hockey players was mandated by the NJSIAA, but individual athletes chose whether or not to utilize protective eyewear.

In football, all sectional state

championship games will be played at neutral sites. Such an arrangement is already standard practice in north and central region finals, but many south regional championship games have regularly been held at the home field of one of the participants. The issue with a championship finalist hosting a game is, of course, that certain teams are given a distinct or at least perceived advantage.

For the 2011 football season, championship games will be played at Kean College, the Meadowlands stadium, Rutgers University and the College of New Jersey.

"Helping our student athletes avoid injury, and keeping competition as fair and balanced as possible are among our core responsibilities as an organization," notes Steven J. Timko, the association's executive director. "And by making these two changes-the protective goggles for girls' field hockey and the switch to all neutral sites for football state finalswe're continuing to live up to these responsibilities with excellent new regulations that I anticipate everyone will embrace."

In another change specific to football, seven has been set as the total number of games a given team must play against in-state competition. This rule revision will free up the schedules of select, elite squads to arrange for games against similarly elite teams from other states, while also helping preserve some traditional, inter-state

At the conclusion of each interscholastic sports season-fall, winter, and spring-NJSIAA committees evaluate all sports to identify necessary revisions to rules and regulations.

### About the NJSIAA

Established in 1918, the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletics Association (NJSIAA) is a voluntary, non-profit organization comprised of 433 accredited public, private and parochial high schools. A member of the National Federation of State High School Associations, the NJSIAA conducts tournaments and crowns champions in 32 sports. Championship competition for girls is sponsored in basketball, bowling, cross country, fencing, field hockey, golf, gymnastics, lacrosse, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, outdoor track, winter track and volleyball. Boys' championships are determined in baseball, basketball, bowling, cross country, fencing, football, golf, ice hockey, lacrosse, soccer, swimming, tennis, outdoor track, winter track, volleyball and wrestling.







Recognizing the invaluable services which the state's EMS volunteers provided in New York City and northern New Jersey on 9/11 and in the weeks following the disaster, the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey today presented a World Trade Center (WTC) artifact to New Jersey State First Aid Council (NJS-FAC) representatives during a private observance at John F. Kennedy International Airport in New York.

17, the airport's official depository of WTC artifacts, the volunteers solemnly and respectfully took possession of the five-foot-long, 338-pound portion of a rusty, twisted steel beam recovered from the Twin Towers site nearly a decade ago. The beam is 34 inches wide and 29 inches high.

"It's quite humbling to be entrusted with this symbol of American resilience," said Barbara Aras, president of the 82-year-old nonprofit NJSFAC, which represents more than 20,000

EMS volunteers affiliated with 350 first aid and rescue squads throughout the Garden State.

"More than 1,000 of our volun-

"More than 1,000 of our volunteers in more than 400 ambulances responded to Manhattan, Liberty State Park and Giants Stadium on 9/11," Aras said. "They witnessed horror, but also saw innumerable acts of kindness and selflessness that remain ingrained in their memories."

On 9/11 and for two weeks afterward, New Jersey's EMS volunteers assisted by answering routine 9-1-1 emergency medical calls in New York City and standing by at Chelsea Pier and Ground Zero, Aras said. During that time, she added, NJSFAC-affiliated volunteer crews also answered every 9-1-1 call received in their own municipalities.

NJ EMS volunteers have provided assistance to New York and Pennsylvania neighbors on numerous occasions, including: the first attack on the World Trade Center in 1993; the Northeast blackouts in 1997 and 2003; the "Miracle on the Hudson" plane landing, with more than 20 ambulances and 100 volunteer EMTs providing passengers and crew with medical assessments, treatment and transport to hospitals; and most recently the "Christmas Blizzard of 2010"

"Of the 2,232 requests made for 9/11 artifacts, the NJSFAC was among 1,132 organizations to be chosen," Executive Director Edward Jan Burdzy said.

Burdzy, of Holland Township, Treasurer Ken Weinberg of Pittstown, Membership Secretary Sue Meyer of Summit and Mary Luster of Kingwood Township, the NJSFAC's 10th District chairperson, accepted the artifact on the council's behalf. "This steel beam represents the irrepressible spirit our volunteers display every day, answering hundreds of thousands of calls annually – free of charge -- and we are grateful for the honor and responsibility of its safe-keeping," Burdzy said.

The council plans to display the WTC beam prominently in the exhibit hall during its annual convention and educational symposium at the Trump Taj Mahal in Atlantic City Oct. 20-22. Council-affiliated volunteers who responded on 9/11 will be asked to sign a plaque, which will be displayed with the artifact at NJSFAC headquarters in Sayreville.

During the convention, members also plan to hold a 10th anniversary memorial service for all who lost their lives on 9/11.

Funeral Services were held at McCriskin-Gustafson Home For Funerals.







Why pay for movie rentals? Come to the library where renting movies is free! We have a great selection from hot new releases to television shows to classics. We have increased our limit of DVDs that you can borrow to eight on a card. The fine is still \$2/day. You cannot place holds on our two day loan movies, which are the new releases and they can be renewed only once. The seven day loan DVDs are able to be held and renewed twice. Be advised that there is a \$.50 charge per item for putting it on hold and you have to pay the hold fee regardless of whether you pick the item up.

We now loan out video games. We have games for the Playstation 3, X-Box 360 and the Nintendo Wii. We are just beginning to build our collection, so we don't have that many games yet. If you don't find anything on your visit, come back and check again. Patrons can check out one video game per card and are allowed only one renewal. Video games circulate for one week and the fine for video games is the same as DVDs, \$2/day. There are no holds allowed on video games.

We also now have Playaway Views. They are different than the other Playaways we have in our collection. Playaway Views are pre-loaded video players that have multiple videos, and contain up to 6 hours of content. Most of our views are for children. There is some non-fiction that may appeal to older patrons. Patrons may borrow two Playaway Views per person. The Playaway Views circulate for one week and may be renewed once. The fine for Playaway Views is the same as DVDs, \$2/day.

With school starting again, our policy regarding children under the age of 18 is back in effect: Between the hours of 2:30 and 6 p.m., anyone 17 and younger must have their library card with a photo either on their library card account or a photo ID with them before entering the library. Parents must come in with their children if they wish to put a photo on the child's library card. Children under 14 who wish to use the Internet must have a parent or guardian who stays with them while they are on the computer.

Our new circulation system will now allow you to be notified through email that your holds are available, when items are overdue, and it will also be able to notify you a couple of days in advance of when an item is going to be due. This should help to

avoid overdue charges. If you would like this to be available to you, you need to go to the circulation desk and provide us with your email address to receive these notifications.

In September, we are going to be offering two computer classes and one class on business databases. The first class will be on computer basics which includes turning a computer on, personalizing the desktop and creating folders, among other topics. This program will be held on Sept. 21 at 10:30 a.m. Space is limited and registration is required. On Sept. 27 the library will be holding a class on how to use our business databases such as Frost and Sullivan and Reference USA. Space is limited and registration is required. For all those who love to listen to audio books in their car or on their iPod or MP3 player or read e-books on their new e-reader, we are a part of ListenNJ. Listen NJ provides free access to two kinds of downloadable books. Audio books, such as MP3 and way files, are recordings for listening. Some downloads are available for iPods and Macintosh computers (when you access the title, it will indicate if it is iPod compatible). E-books are digital books that are read on either a computer screen or on a portable reader. Patrons should connect via the link "Free audio book downloads" on our home page southplainfield lib.nj.us. Then choose the ListenNJ link you want. Either go to the home page or go directly to their e-book collection. You can then log in with your valid library card to download desired titles. Please note that your account must be in good standing for this service to work. The ListenNJ website provides help and a list of compatible devices.

before you put it on the market will give the biggest bang for your fix-up buck, as long as you are using colors that conform to the neighborhood's decorating norm."




