#### Sewer Increase Goes Into Effect Jan. 1

The Borough Council passed a resolution to increase the sewer tax by 11/2% at a public meeting held on December 5.

The increase amounts to an additional \$5 per year for homeowners, increasing the annual fee to \$320, which is billed twice a year in March and October. For those who qualify for a senior reduction, the increase is \$2.50 a year. The increase will take effect on January 1.

According to CFO Glenn Cullen, "This is just a pass through of the increase that the Middlesex County Utility Authority (MCUA) levied to the Plainfield Area Regional Sewer Authority (PARSA), and PARSA in turn, levied to the borough."

The last sewer tax increase was in January when MCUA increased its sewer treatment rates. The hike forced the borough to raise rates by more than 11%, the largest line item increase in the borough's sewer utility budget.

Along with the unanimous approval of the increase, the governing body sent a copy of the resolution to MCUA stating, "This rate increase will directly increase the sewer fees paid by businesses and residents of South Plainfield during a national recession and during a time that these businesses and residents can least afford an increase." It also asked them to "find ways to cut its costs and, if need be, utilize more surplus, in order to reduce and rescind any rate increase to MCUA users, including PARSA and the Borough of South Plainfield." A copy was also sent to all PARSA and MCUA members, the clerk of the Middlesex County Board of Chosen Freeholders and all of its members.

Democrats Chrissy Buteas and Franky Salerno both voted no to the latest increase. Buteas said, "The council has done nothing to try and correct some of the system's problems that are occurring, which are escalating the billings to South Plainfield; for instance, the infiltration problem during rain."

"We have been laser focused on managing property taxes in the borough through cost reduction wherever possible," said Mayor Matt Anesh.

#### **Two Police Officers Promoted**

Two South Plainfield police officers were promoted during the Borough Council meeting held December 5. Sergeant Daniel Noonan was promoted to lieutenant and Officer Daniel Hoppe was promoted to sergeant.

Lt. Daniel Noonan is a 15-year veteran of law enforcement, having joined the South Plainfield Police Department in January 1996. He served as an officer in the patrol section of the Operations Division and later as a detective in the Criminal Investigation Bureau. After obtaining the rank of sergeant in 2004, he again served in the patrol section of the Operations Division. For the past six years, Noonan served as a detective sergeant in the Criminal Investigation Bureau of the Service Division.

Noonan will assume the role of commander of the Service Division, which is comprised of a sergeant, three general assignment detectives, two iuvenile detectives and a secretary

Noonan is married and lives in South Plainfield. He graduated from Rutgers University in 1994 with a bachelor of science degree. He served as an agent for the Middlesex County Prosecutor's Office before joining the South Plainfield Police Department.

Sgt. Daniel Hoppe is a nine year veteran of law enforcement. He joined the South Plainfield Police Department in January 2005. He served as a patrolman in the Patrol Section of the Operations Division. He previously worked for the New York City Police Department, walking a foot post in the East Flatbush section of Brooklyn for the 67th Precinct and the Mount Olive Police Department for the Patrol Division. Hoppe will assume the role of patrol shift supervisor and will provide direct supervision to ap-

proximately six patrol officers during in exercise physiology. their tour of duty.

Until recently, Hoppe was a lifelong resident of South Plainfield, graduating from South Plainfield High School in 1997. He attended William Paterson University, where he received a bachelor of science degree

Hoppe has been married to wife Vanessa, for four years. They have a daughter, Adriana. Hoppe is the son of Charles and Merry Hoppe and has three brothers, Charles Jr., Michael and Matthew, and a sister, Jillian.

#### Bergen, Middlesex and Passaic Counties Added to Federal Disaster Declaration for October's Storm

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has approved Bergen, Middlesex and Passaic Counties for federal disaster reimbursement to cover public sector damages and costs related to the severe storm on October 29.

"Further review of the state's request has resulted in eligibility for recovery assistance for three additional New Jersey counties," said Governor Christie. "Now, Bergen, Middlesex and Passaic Counties can fully recover from one of the most intense early season storms that our state has experienced in recent years."

In the aftermath of the October storm, Governor Christie sent a formal request to the White House for federal disaster assistance. A comprehensive storm damage assessment led by the New Jersey Office of Emergency Management (OEM) in conjunction with federal, county and local officials was completed. On December 1, FEMA approved of the counties of Cape May, Essex, Hunterdon, Morris, Somerset, Sussex, Union and Warren for aid. The announcement of eligibility for Bergen, Middlesex and Passaic counties follows continued work by state, federal and local officials to fully determine the level of damage, and brings a total of 11 counties eligible under

the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Public Assistance Program.

The state, county and local governments, and certain eligible private nonprofit organizations can apply for assistance on a cost-sharing basis for emergency work and the repair or replacement of facilities damaged by the storm. New Jersey Office OEM officials are scheduling meetings for

the newly designated counties regarding the application process.

State and local emergency management officials are currently managing the recovery related to four active Presidential Disaster Declarations. More information about these declarations, and the recovery process, can be found online at: www.fema.gov/ news/disasters\_state.fema?id=34.

The Junior Midget cheer squad competed at the Pop Warner Little Scholars National Dance and Cheer Competition on December 7 in



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

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### Preserving Memories for More Than a Quarter Century 27th Annual Tree Lighting Honors Victims of Plane Crash

For the 27th year, the 85 foot high fir tree that sits on the front lawn of the McCriskin-Gustafson Home For Funerals was the center of attention during the tree lighting ceremonies last Saturday. When lit, the magnificent tree can be seen several blocks away.

The first tree lighting was held in December of 1985 in memory of the tragic plane crash in Gander, Newfoundland, Canada which occurred on December 12, 1985. Two hundred and forty-six servicemen, all members of the 101st Airborne Screaming Eagles, and eight crew members were killed shortly after take-off. They had been on their way home for the holidays, returning from a peace-keeping mission in Egypt. The disaster, one of the worst in Canadian aviation history, is still shrouded in controversy.

Members of the South Plainfield High School Traveling Choir, led by Joan Stasio, entertained the crowd by singing holiday songs before, during and after the ceremony.

More than 100 people attended the ceremony, including Mayor Matt Anesh and members of the council.

The tree lighting ceremony began with a welcome by Rick McCriskin. Rev. Charles Mingle read the invocation. McCriskin gave a short explanation of why the tree is lit each year. He also read a poem dedicated to those who died in the plane crash.

Pulling the switch to light the tree was Rev. John Paul Alvarado, Pastor of Sacred Heart Church, who was joined by members of the South Plainfield Pop Warner Junior Midget Cheerleaders. *Amazing Grace* was played by the bagpipers, followed by *Taps*. The Eagles cheerleader teams have been part of the tree lighting for several years now. Father Alvarado closed the ceremony with a prayer.

Santa and Frosty the Snowman arrived via fire truck just as the ceremony was ending. After spending time greeting the children, they led



the way down Plainfield Avenue to Flanagan's for a reception. They were followed by the members of the choir, who led the carolers in singing holiday songs.

Earlier in the day, members of the Screaming Eagles General McAuliffe Division placed a wreath commemorating the event at the base of the tree.

His hometown and school have been holding fundraisers and sending him pictures, cards and voicemail message. His uncle, who lives in Lake Hopatcong, has started fundraising there as well.

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

The salesgirl simply stared back, as if Emma had lost her

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
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#### Midnight Madness Kicks Off Basketball Season
