BOROUGH COUNCIL REORGANIZES FOR 2012

Rusnak selected to serve as president for the all-Republican council

The 2012 South Plainfield Borough Council held a reorganization meeting at the Senior Center last Saturday. The event was attended by more than 400 residents. Honored guests included Lt. Governor Kim Guadagno, Former Governor Donald DiFrancesco, State Senator Samuel Thompson, Former Mayor Charles Butrico, Police Chief James Parker, former CFO Charlie Haus, former council members

Darlene Pinto and Dennis Little, and BOE Vice President Debbie Boyle and BOE member Bill Seesselberg.

The ceremony began with Laine Harris performing the National Anthem and an invocation by Rev. Charles Mingle. Lt. Governor Guadagno administered the oath of office to the three incoming councilmen, Alex Barletta, Derryck White and Richard "Dick" Frank. Barletta and White

were elected in November to three year terms and Frank was elected for a one-year term to fill the unexpired term of Mayor Matt Anesh.

For the first time in borough history, the mayor and council is comprised entirely of Republican members.

Outgoing Councilwoman Chrissy Buteas and Councilman Franky Salerno each gave a brief speech thanking the residents of South Plainfield for their support during their three-year terms. Mayor Anesh presented both with plaques of appreciation for their time on

the council.

The members of the council unanimously voted to reelect Ray Rusnak to serve as council president. After Rusnak was sworn in by Chief Parker, he announced the committee assignments for the 2012 council.

In the mayor's annual message, Anesh presented a synopsis of the events of the past year, including the numerous snow storms that required massive cleanups by the Public Works Department and the damage incurred in August when Hurricane Irene left many neighborhoods flooded.

He also reported on the accomplishments that occurred in 2011, including the submission of the Truck Bypass permit for state approval, new businesses such as GloPak Corp. which moved its facility here, the PSE&G expansion and new retailer Hobby Lobby which will be opening this year.

The mayor also spoke about the belt tightening which took place during 2011 in an effort to keep taxes down, including negotiating a new contract with the police department which saved the borough thousands of dollars, and the streamlining of

the process of paying property tax bills by adding the convenience of accepting credit card payments. (See page 6 and 7 for mayor's full address and additional reorganization coverage.)

The firm of DiFrancesco, Bateman, Coley, Yospin, Kunzman, Davis & Lehrer was reappointed as 2012 borough attorney. Mayoral and council appointments were announced and the members were sworn in by DiFrancesco.

All appointments received unanimous votes, as did the special appointments and special resolutions.

The 2012 Executive Board president is Gary Stevenson; Dave Zushma is vice president; treasurer is Joe Sierzega; and trustees are Bill Conti, Ed Sihaneck and John Abbruzzese.

Councilman/Fire Commissioner Rob Bengivenga presented Completion of Probation Commendations to firefighters Andrew Kociumbus, Alex Nieradka, Samantha Hogan, Nick Smith, Jurrien Kratz, Nick Sacco and Nick Figler.

EMT firefighters Shayne Lugo, Samantha Hogan and

Stephen Phillips also received commendations.

Buteas Cites Assisting Residents Top Feat of Term on Council

Democrats Chrissy Buteas and Franky Salerno ended their three-year Borough Council terms at the annual Reorganization Meeting held on Saturday at the Senior Center.

Buteas and runningmate John Sorrentino were defeated by Republicans Derryck White and Alex Barletta in the November election. Salerno chose not to run for a second term.

Buteas said her greatest accomplishment on the council was "having the ability to assist residents with matters they brought to my attention." She said she also enjoyed "serving on many different committees and working with them to improve the quality of life for our residents."

A lifelong resident, Buteas holds a master's degree in public administration, and served on the Board of Adjustment, the Recreation Commission, Health Advisory Board, Senior Advisory Board, the Green Team, Environmental Commission, Booster Club, Suburban Woman's Club and the Public Celebrations Committee. Most recently, Buteas chaired

the Health, Welfare and Environment Committee and served on the Public Works and Economic Development committees. In the past she was liaison to the Board of Education Shared Services Program and helped initiate the Women's History Month Essay Contest in the schools.

"As for future plans," said Buteas, "I will continue to stay involved in our local government by remaining active on

numerous committees."

Salerno was elected at the age of 25 in November 2008. Last year he served as chair of Public Works and served on the Recreation and Health, Welfare and Environment Committee.

"Thank you to all residents of South Plainfield. It's such a huge honor to me that I was able to serve for the last three years," said Salerno. "Thank you for making me the man I am today."

Since the day after my great nephew, Zach Szala, was bitten by a snake, the outpouring of concern has been overwhelming. Zach went from a little boy on an outing with his family, to being revived in an ambulance on his way to the hospital where he would be placed on a ventilator, feeding tube and found to be partially paralyzed. So much happened in the days and weeks that followed; the prognosis was not known and there was so much uncertainty. There was, however, one constant. That was the support that came in the form of cards, letters, donations, gifts, visits from sports figures, members of bands, classmates and, most of all, positive thoughts and prayers. These came from people both

known and unknown, and for that I am most grateful.

Zach was released from the hospital on December 30. Although most of the paralysis is gone, he still does not have full mobility. His diet continues to be limited, as does his movement and he'll require considerable medical treatment for an unforeseen amount of time. His recovery will be long, and I'm sure difficult. But Zach is strong as is his family and we all remain positive for his future.

Gang Members Incarcerated for Armed Robberies in South Plainfield

Two members of a sect of the Bloods street gang, Sex, Money, Murder, have been imprisoned for initiating a 16 year-old boy into the gang and using him to help commit an armed robbery at a fast food restaurant and an attempt to rob another restaurant in South Plainfield, according to Middlesex County Prosecutor Bruce J. Kaplan.

Danique Simpson, 18, of South Plainfield was sentenced to seven and a half years in a New Jersey state prison, and a co-defendant, James Richardson, 20, of Prospect Park was sentenced to serve 14 years in prison for their roles in the crimes.

The sentences were imposed in New Brunswick on December 19 by Superior Court Judge Bradley Fer-

encz, who said the defendants must serve 85 percent of their prison terms before they can be eligible for parole. He also reduced their prison terms by nearly two years for the time spent in custody since their arrests.

The terms were imposed after the defendants pleaded guilty on November 1. The guilty pleas were entered under an agreement reached with Middlesex County Deputy First Assistant Prosecutor Christopher

Kuberiet.

Following an intensive investigation by Detective Garrett Cassio and Detective Christopher Colucci, both of the South Plainfield Police Department, Simpson, Richardson and a third gang member, Ryan Crouch, 21, of South Plainfield were charged with attempting to rob the Wendy's restaurant on Oak Tree Avenue on May 8 and robbing \$118 from a Burger King restaurant on Park Avenue on May 9.

During the investigation, South Plainfield police learned that the defendants initiated the 16 year-old boy into their gang during a ceremony which involved severely beating him for about 15 minutes in Piscataway.

They subsequently used the boy to rob both fast food restaurants.

The boy, whose identity is being withheld because of his age, pleaded guilty to juvenile offenses in Family Court in New Brunswick and is currently serving a seven year term in a juvenile facility.

Simpson was also a juvenile at the time of the offenses, but was waived up to Superior Court for trial as an adult. He subsequently pleaded guilty.

Crouch, who is facing eight years in prison for his role in the crimes, is scheduled to be sentenced on March 5.

Prosecutor Kaplan praised the South Plainfield Police Department and its detectives for their work on the case.

Three Arrested in Attempted Burglary at Sal's Spirit Shoppe

South Plainfield Police responded to Sal's Spirit Shoppe on Park Avenue Monday afternoon on the report of an attempted theft. Responding officers were told that two males entered the store and attempted to steal a bottle of Cirac Red Berry, valued at \$37.99. As the perpetrators attempted to leave, they were confronted by an employee and a struggle ensued. They dropped the bottle, and fled the scene in a silver Toyota Camry.

Plainfield Police stopped the Toyota on Spruce Street a short time later and apprehended three suspects. The Toyota was reported stolen from Scotch Plains on January 3.

The two adults and one juvenile

male were positively identified as those involved in the robbery at Sal's Spirit Shoppe.

Jahquan Tereek Goffe, 19 and Bruce Darby, 18, both of Plainfield, as well as a 17 year-old male also from Plainfield, were arrested and charged with robbery, conspiracy to commit a crime and receiving stolen property. The juvenile is being held in the Middlesex County Juvenile Detention facility in North Brunswick. Goffe and Darby were each held on \$75,000 bail.

The employee was not injured during the struggle.

The incident is being investigated by Officer Ahmad Stuckey and Det. Vincent Campagna.

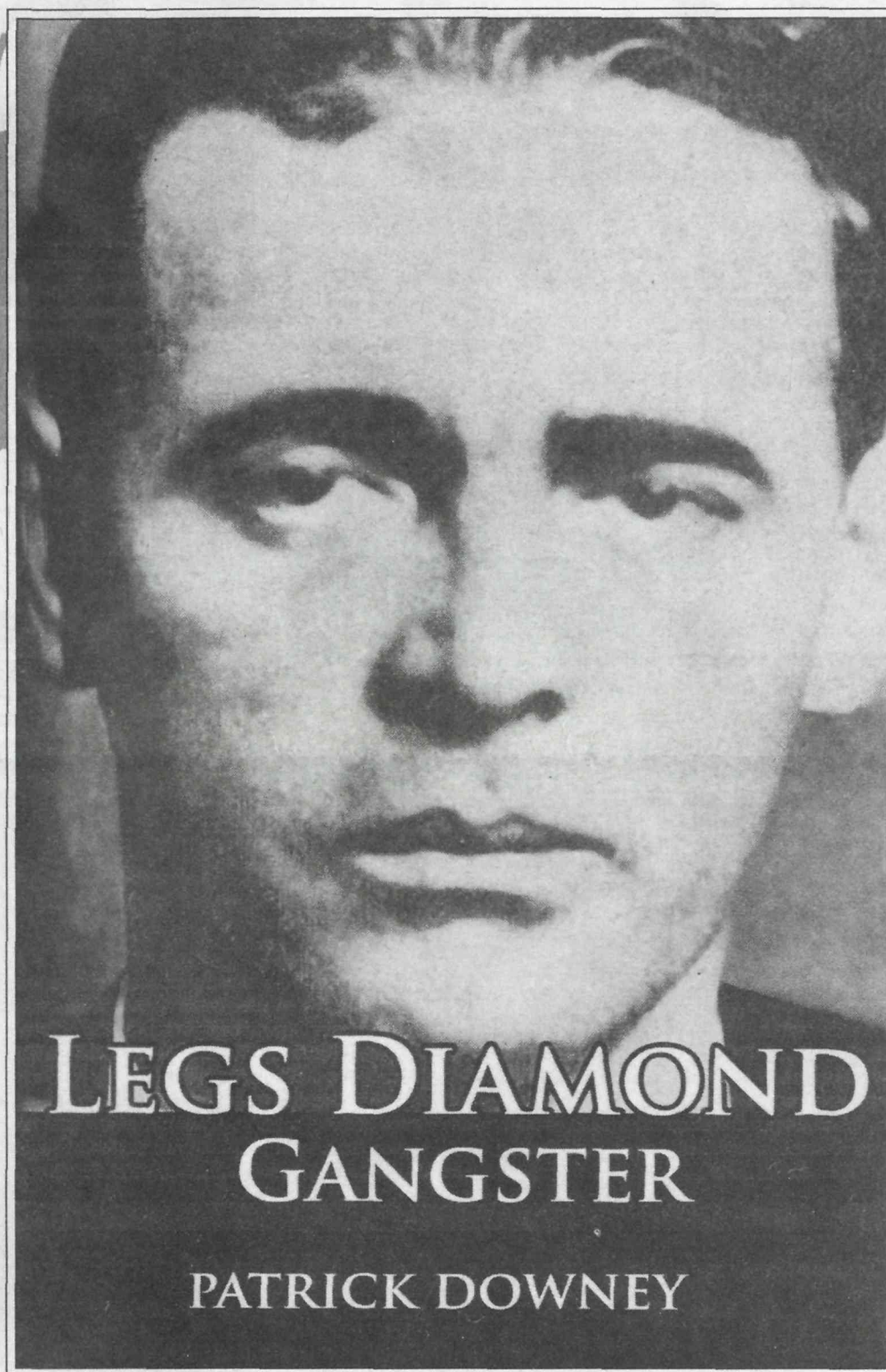

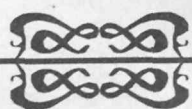

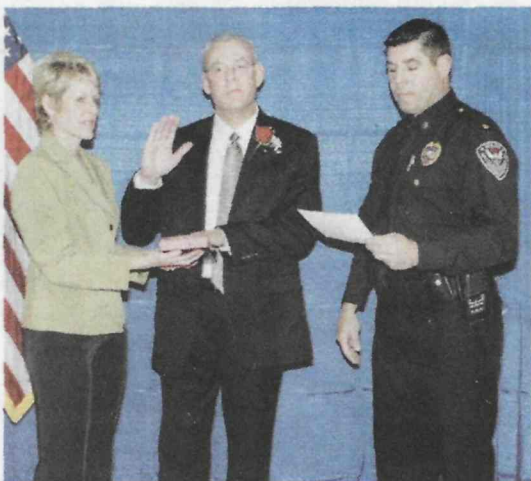

Mayor Matt Anesh

Welcome and thank you for joining us today for the Borough of South Plainfield's annual reorganization meeting. Today, we pause briefly to reflect on the challenges and triumphs of 2011. We also take an opportunity to share some goals and objectives for 2012.

We welcome back Councilman Barletta after a brief recess. Your election to the borough council is evidence of the voter's confidence in your ability and performance as a public servant. Congratulations and best wishes on your new term.

We also welcome newly elected Councilman Dick Frank and Councilman Derryck White. The residents of South Plainfield have bestowed upon you a great honor that comes with great responsibility. Listen to their concerns, keep an open mind and draw upon your strengths to improve the borough for all residents.

Thank you to Councilwoman Buteas and Councilman Salerno for your service to the residents of the borough over the past three years.

Many of the challenges we faced in 2010 continued to present themselves in 2011. Persistently high unemployment at the state and federal level coupled with a depressed real estate market and rising costs for basic necessities challenged residents of every New Jersey municipality. In spite of a tough economic environment, the 2011 governing body was able to introduce a budget that controlled taxes and spending. Taxes on the municipal level were on average \$138 less than 2009, producing a two-year savings of \$316 for a resident with the average assessment. Municipal spending was controlled for the second year in a row, without drastic cuts or interruption to essential borough services or community events, including our Labor Day Parade. Thank you Councilman McConville and Councilwoman Buteas and the entire Public Celebrations Committee for your hard work.

During 2011, we continued to ask our borough departments and employees to do more with less. After trimming the size of the boroughs workforce by more than a dozen positions through attrition and reorganization in 2010, departments across the borough continued to meet and exceed the challenges presented. Hurricane Irene and an October snowstorm both resulted in widespread power outages that challenged all borough departments and placed great strain on our Public Works and Public Safety Departments. Thank you to DPW Supervisor Bobby Capparelli and the entire Public Works Department. I'm proud of the hard work and accomplishments of our borough employees during 2011.

Our focus has been to run a lean local government. While we continue to have a historically trim workforce, we must ensure that we can meet our core responsibilities. Therefore, we've strategically replaced retired employees in our public works and police department. In doing so, we took advantage

of recently renegotiated labor agreements that are fair to our employees and our residents. Our new Policemen's Benevolent Associate contract focused on long-term and short-term changes aimed to reduce costs. We thank the PBA for working with the borough during these tough times.

We welcomed a new police chief, James Parker, in January. Through his leadership and the dedication of our fine police force, overall crime decreased 6% from 2010. In addition, police department overtime was decreased 30%. Thank you chief, and thank you to the entire police department. Chief Parker and Council President Ray Rusnak were instrumental in coordinating a seamless plan to handle the PGA's Barclays tournament held at the Plainfield Country Club in August. While ensuring little disruption to the town, the borough also was able to guarantee all overtime and tournament related costs were covered by the PGA in advance of the first round.

We also welcome a new fire chief in 2012, Tom Scalera. We owe a debt of gratitude to former Chief Larry DelNegro for the last 10 years as chief and his continued service in 2012 as a deputy chief. Thank you Chief DelNegro, and congratulations and best wishes to Chief Scalera. It's no secret that South Plainfield has the best fire department in the state, volunteer or paid. This year the department responded to over 1,400 calls and logged over 16,000 firefighter hours. This November, after nearly 18 months of planning, community and business involvement, the fire department unveiled a training prop on borough property that will allow some training to occur locally, saving both valuable time and department funds. Thank you to the men and women of our fire department for all that you do.

The South Plainfield Emergency Medical Services also had a very active 2011. Our volunteer EMS force responded to nearly 900 calls and logged nearly 23,000 volunteer hours. With the assistance of EMS Chief Eddie LaFerrera, Borough Administrator Glenn Cullen, Council President Ray Rusnak and Public Safety Liaison Councilman Robert Bengivenga, the borough was able to negotiate a daytime coverage contract with Somerset Medical at no cost to borough taxpayers and at an annual savings of \$15,000 compared with prior contracts. Additionally, Somerset Medical has offered to provide training to our EMS volunteers free of charge. Thank you to President Hackett and the men and women of the EMS for your continued dedication.

South Plainfield is also very fortunate to have a vibrant Office of Emergency Management. With the help of many C.E.R.T. volunteers, our OEM staff supports the borough with emergency coordination from structure fires to natural disasters. We are grateful for the excellent teamwork and leadership displayed throughout 2011.

Despite a challenging economic environment, South Plainfield continued to welcome new business to town and

was pleased to assist with the expansion plans of existing businesses. We welcomed family run manufacturing businesses such as GloPak Corporation to family run eateries such as Habaneros Mexican Grill. We were pleased to work with major corporations such as PSE&G to expand their current operations in town. And we like what we see ahead in 2012 including new retailers for Middlesex Mall such as Hobby Lobby to the planned multi-million dollar expansion of Ferro Corporation and the development of a regional claims office for Progressive Insurance.

We continued to invest in our town's infrastructure with the completion of Phase Two of the New Market Avenue reconstruction project. We paved Rahway, Kenyon, Oxford and McKinley streets. The borough was the beneficiary of a \$3.5M dollar grant from the State Local Aid Infrastructure Fund for the Park Avenue/Conrail bridge project. We continued to provide our Department of Public Works with the vital tools needed to successfully perform their mission. Through a variety of grants and funding we invested in vehicles for the recycling center, senior center and the police department, provided radios for our EMS department and equipment for our fire department.

In August, the borough unveiled a new website. While revamping the look and feel of the site, the borough also reduced the site maintenance costs by nearly 67%. Additionally, the borough entered into the social networking space with the launch of "The Borough of South Plainfield" Facebook page. Both the website and the Facebook page offered additional ways for residents to stay informed during critical events, such as Hurricane Irene to simple notices such as road closures and special events. Thank you to our Administrator Glenn Cullen and his staff for making these tools as effective as they have been for the borough.

We made improvements to our recreation complex by opening additional parking for both Pop Warner football and soccer games. We replaced the playground equipment at the community pool with the assistance of the Recreation Commission who funded over 60% of the costs of the new equipment. We hired a part time senior center coordinator to provide greater coverage and coordination for our senior center events. Mrs. Olano

is off to a great start and has instituted some exciting new programs such as the "South Plainfield Side Pockets," a new billiards club launched in early October.

In September, we came together as a community to pay our respects for those who lost their lives on September 11, 2001. We joined with community groups from the Elks to the American Legion and held a true community ceremony to mark the tenth anniversary of that tragic day. We thank the entire committee for all of their hard work. In another example of true community involvement, a team lead by Zoning Board member David Miglis provided a much-needed facelift to the Municipal Court and Council Chambers by volunteering their time and talents. The result, a brighter more modern looking chamber that featured 96 less light bulbs while offering a brighter space.

Our commitment to health and the environment was reinforced with the formation of the Green Team and the kick off of the Mayor's Wellness Campaign Health Fair. In 2012 we will seek community volunteers to join the Mayor's Wellness Campaign Committee to further these important initiatives.

2011 also marked a major milestone for the Hollywood Avenue Extension project with the filing of the NJ Department of Environmental Protection permit application. The borough has received preliminary feedback from the NJ DEP and additional funding has been put in place to complete engineering studies requested by the agency. Our Ad hoc committee formed under Council President Bengivenga in 2008 has accomplished their mission. I challenge the committee to optimistically look ahead and assist the borough in identifying much-needed resources to fund the road construction. I look forward to working with Councilman Bengivenga, the ad hoc committee, and the entire council and the state to see this much needed project progress through the permit phase.

As we turn the page on 2011 and look forward to 2012, we expect once again to be faced with a difficult economic climate. We must remain focused on delivering essential services to our residents while keeping taxes and spending in check. To do so we will need to continue to control overtime costs and leverage part time opportunities where it makes business sense. We will continue to look to build on

our current portfolio of shared services agreements with Middlesex County and the South Plainfield Board of Education to find additional areas where we can drive down costs. Thank you to board member Debbie Boyle for your tireless work in promoting shared services opportunities in South Plainfield and for making our relationship a model for municipalities across the state.

In 2012 we must continue to focus on economic development. I thank Councilman Barletta for his hard work last year in improving communication and accessibility to elected officials for the business community. Councilman Barletta was a true partner and assisted me in promoting South Plainfield to current and prospective businesses. Today, I ask Councilman Barletta to expand our borough website to include a much needed Economic Development page. South Plainfield has much to offer and we must remain active participants to encourage smart economic growth. I look forward to working with the Business Advisory Group and the South Plainfield Business Association to build upon the great work they are doing to showcase business in our town.

And finally, we must continue to improve our communication and service delivery to our residents. During 2011, we offered new ways for residents to receive Yard Waste Decals and pay tax bills. We challenged a business as usual mindset to make dealing with local government more convenient. Make no mistake about it we are a large customer service organization. I challenge the council to work with your department heads and review how we interact with our residents. Continue to challenge the status quo and to pursue innovative and convenient ways for residents to interact with the borough. Let us raise the bar and set a model for all municipalities to strive for.

I'm optimistic about 2012. I believe that while we have accomplished much over the last year, our best days clearly lie ahead of us. I look forward to working with the council, department heads, borough employees and volunteer members of our boards and agencies to ensure our borough remains on the path to success. Your commitment, involvement and ideas are critical ingredients to our collective success.

Tournament directors Ralph Feh and Lori Gerstl have noted that 100% of the profits from this event will be dispensed as follows: 50%

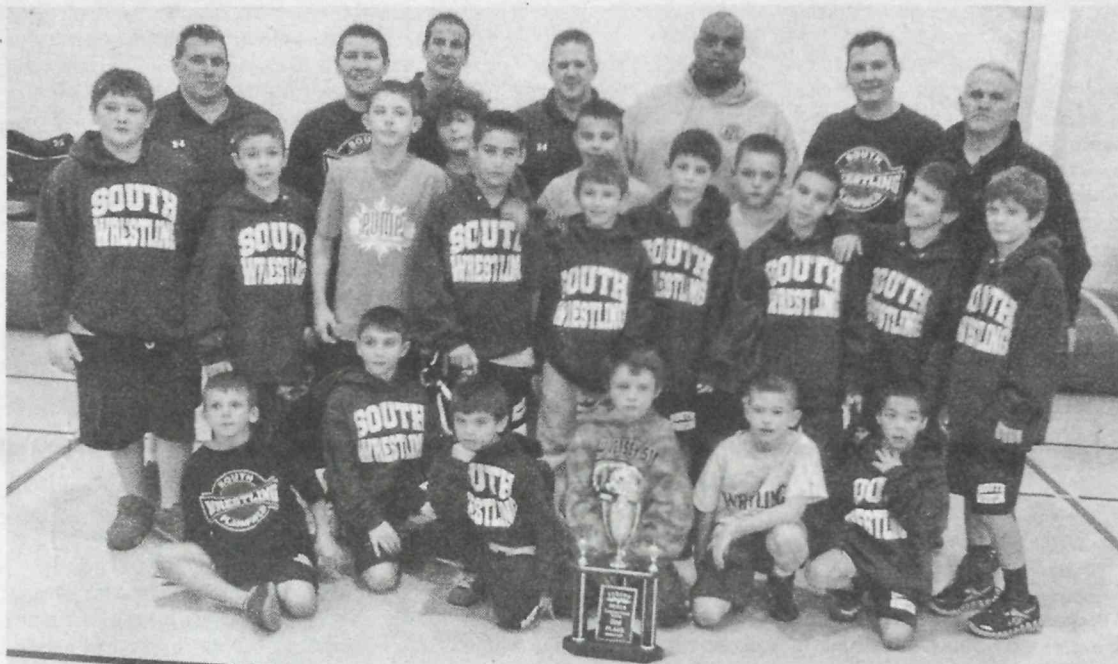

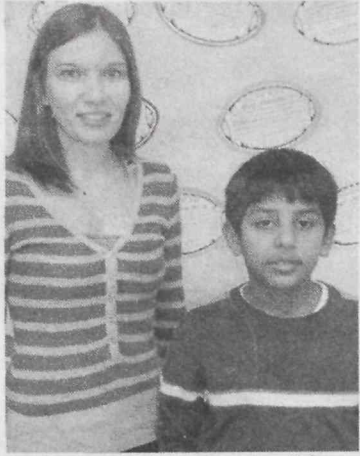

Jim DiCarlo to Launch Innovative Food Waste Recycling Project in Hawaii

Jim DiCarlo, a resident of Haleiwa, Hawaii and the son of South Plainfield pediatrician J. Patricia DiCarlo, is on a mission to change the way the world thinks about waste. Last year he started a company called Each One Teach One Farms after teaching aquaponics and sustainability to his seventh grade class.

"The idea came to me then that more people should have access to this information about sustainability and growing food..." DiCarlo says

on his website, ThrowToGrow.com. "I am fiercely passionate about sustainable food production and living a more self-sufficient lifestyle that is in harmony with nature. I believe that everyone should be able to grow their own clean food."

To that end, DiCarlo has been promoting Bokashi fermentation, or rapid anaerobic composting, as a way to recycle food waste in an effort to address the continuing landfill overflow problem. This process also provides rich soil that can be used by farmers and gardeners alike. Up until

now, composting has been limited to individuals using a home composter, such as the Bokashi Bucket; however, composting has yet to be implemented on an industrial scale.

"I thought, 'What if I could scale up this Bokashi process to recycle much larger volumes of food waste, from larger waste generators like schools, hotels or supermarkets here in Hawaii,'" DiCarlo said.

Without the resources to further pursue his idea, DiCarlo turned to Kickstarter.com, a "crowd-funding" resource for "creative minds and 'out of the box thinkers'" that has gained in popularity in recent years.

According to San Diego-based company, TheDailyCrowdsourcing, "crowdsourcing" is the practice of tasking out a project to a "crowd" of people, rather than to just one person. Crowd-funding is just a small part of this innovative new trend. For example, in order to raise funds for a specific project like DiCarlo's, hundreds or even thousands of individual investors can contribute an amount as small as \$1. DailyCrowdsourcing.com highlighted DiCarlo's project on December 22.

Throw To Grow has received pledges of more than \$5,100 to date, but must reach its goal of raising \$15,000 by January 19 or the project will not be funded.

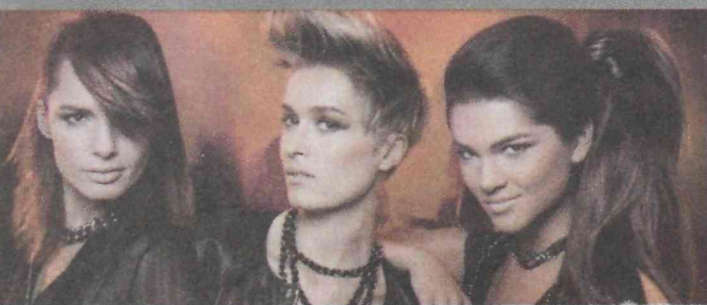
