

Recent legislation allowed communities to move their school elections from the third Tuesday in April to the General Election in November. On

# **High School Hall of Fame Candidates Selected**

A "Hall of Fame" was established at South Plainfield High School to honor graduates for achievements in business, government, academics, community service and the humanities.

Acknowledging these successful graduates recognizes them as leaders in their fields and also provides current high school students with positive role models from their own

community. The candidates selected for 2012 are Michael Binder and Thomas Lanza.

The inductees will be honored on Tuesday, May 22 with a luncheon at Flanagan's in South Plainfield. An induction ceremony will take place at 7 p.m. that same evening in South Plainfield High School's Joseph A. Mondoro Auditorium preceding the annual academic awards.

January 18 South Plainfield approved their resolution to move the school board member election to November. Doing so places the district's school board candidates on the November ballot-but eliminates the need to present the proposed school budget to voters as long as it remains at or below the state's 2% levy cap.

Throughout the state, 468 school districts will have board member elections in November 2012, while 73 school districts retained April school elections.

The South Plainfield Board of Education will have three, three-year board member positions on the ballot in the November 2012 election. Members of the school board whose terms would have expired after the April 2012 election will continue to serve until the board's organization meeting, which will be held the first week in January 2013.

# **Athletic Achievements Dominate BOE Meeting**

Recognition of the South Plainfield High School Wrestling Team continued at the April 18 Board of Education meeting, just two days after the team was honored at the Borough Council meeting.

The team was named number one in the state by the State Coaches Association as well as the Home News Tribune, the Courier News and the Star-Ledger for winning the Group II Wrestling Championship for the second time in three seasons. Each of the 39 members of the team and five managers were called up to receive their certificate by Head Wrestling Coach Kevin McCann with help from assistant coaches Matt Anderson, John Foscolo and Craig Salvatore. Football was also on the agenda, with Gary Cassio designated to be named head coach at \$6,829 starting August 15. Cassio, who is a South Plainfield police officer, was head 2011, as well as an assistant football coach in previous years. Before the board voted, former SPEA President Louise Mruz questioned interim Superintendent of Schools Dr. Gary Bowen on why Cassio, who has a substitute teaching license, was selected instead of two applicants who are fully qualified teachers.

"He [Cassio] was the best choice," said Dr. Bowen.

Support for Cassio came from resident Ken Torchia, who was backed by students. "These students support Gary on so many different levels. They play hard for him and respect him."

Borough Council President Ray Rusnak also spoke in favor of Cassio saying, "His character will be great for the students."

The vote to appoint Cassio was unanimous. Also, before the presentations were made to the athletes, third and fourth grade students from Riley School played four musical selections on their recorders as part of the Recorder Karate Program directed by music teacher Tobie Baldwin.


# **MCC to Offer Saturday Hours**



Brain tumors are the second leading cause of cancer-related deaths in children (males and females) under


