Nominees Sought For Cappy Award

Grant School Students Graduate Program From Annual E

Led by DARE Police Officer Llovd McNelly, Grant Elementary School held its annual DARE graduation ceremony on May 15 for fifth grade students. Officer McNelly spent a semester with the children giving them the background needed to answer the sophisticated question often posed by youngsters about drugs and crime through the nationwide Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) program.

DARE was founded in 1983 in Los Angeles and has proven so successful that it is now being implemented in 75 percent of the nation's school districts and in more than 43 countries around the world. It is a police officer-led series of classroom lessons that teaches children from kindergarten through twelfth grade how to resist peer pressure and live productive drug and violence-free lives.

Overwhelming national and international demand for DARE led to the creation of DARE America, a national non-profit organization that serves as a resource to communities, helping to establish and improve local programs and provides officer training. They also support the development and evaluation of the curriculum, provide student educational materials, monitor instruction standards and program results, and create national awareness for the program.

Attending the ceremony to congratulate the class were Police Chief Jim Parker, Capt. Matt Koep, Superintendent Dr. Steve Genco, CFO Glenn Cullen, Mayor Matt Anesh, Council President Ray Rusnak, Councilmembers Derryck White and Rob Bengivenga, along with school Principal Ellen Decker-Lorys and Assistant Principal Rob Richkus.

To complete the course, students are asked to either draw a poster or write an essay on what they have learned from the program. This year McNelly felt that there were so many worthy entries that he decided to recognize not only the winners, but also gave out numerous honorable mentions to outstanding projects completed by the children.

PSE&G to Trim Trees

PSE&G began trimming trees in South Plainfield on May 14. The work is expected to be completed by the end of June. Areas to be trimmed include Woodland, Maple, Park and Sprague avenues. The work will be done on weekdays between the hours of 7 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

Tree trimming improves the reliability of electric service by keeping limbs and branches away from power lines. PSE&G's arborists and tree-trimming contractors adhere to a four-year tree trimming cycle to reduce the possibility of electric outages. Tree limbs can bring down power lines and knock out electricity when there are thunderstorms or high winds. Even in fair weather, trees can interrupt service when they grow and come in contact with energized wires and equipment.

The vegetation management staff and contractors understand the value and beauty of having trees in front of customers' homes but have to trim them so they don't jeopardize the safety of residents and of the electric system. Growth is pruned away from energized wires and poles along roads and highways using techniques that preserve the health of the tree and direct future growth away from power lines. An attempt was made whenever possible to minimize the impact on the trees.

These environmentally sound techniques meet the standards of the International Society of Arboriculture and the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) A 300 Standards for Tree Care Operations.

PSE&G's website, www.pseg.com/ treetrim, has information about the utility's tree trimming program as well as useful tips for selecting the right type of tree to plant underneath or near utility poles.

Brothers Indicted for Making Threats, Conspiracy

Jaswinder Pinghlia, 53, and brother Gursurinder Pinghlia, 56, both of South Clinton Avenue, were indicted last Wednesday in Somerset County Superior Court on charges of third degree conspiracy, third degree creating a false public alarm and third degree making threats to create improper influence in official and political matters.


The brothers were originally charged in February for making terroristic threats. The two had been sending 38 page faxes to St. Peter's University Hospital in New Brunswick and other public and private entities threatening to kill upwards of a "thousand people" if they did not get their way in a civil matter regarding a trailer in foreclosure in Franklin Township.

During an interview by investigators, the brothers stated that the correspondence was to "wake up the government" about problems they were having in regards to their trailer being removed and, specifically, the zoning inspector.

Earlier this year, their house, located on South Clinton Avenue, donned two enormous wooden signs painted with violent threats in broken English condemning borough officials all the way up to the president.

Department of Education Method Calculates Lower Graduation Rates

The South Plainfield High School graduation rate was approximately 5% lower in 2012 compared to the previous year according to a new method for calculating graduation rates mandated by the New Jersey Department of Education. In 2010 South Plainfield reported a 98.30% graduation rate; in 2011 the new four year adjusted graduation rate was lowered to 93.29% based on the new methodology.

Previously the method of calculating the graduation rate had been to divide the number of seniors who had enrolled at the beginning of the year plus the number of students who had dropped out over the previous four years; however, that system did not account for every student.

The new "four year cohort" graduation calculation rate requires information on every student enrolled in the

district in the ninth grade and those transferring from another school to be placed in the New Jersey Standards Measurement and Resource for Teaching (NJ SMART) database for four years. A student is considered a "dropout" if there is no documentation of transferring to another school. The U.S. Department of Education has required all states to report their graduation rates using the "four year cohort" beginning with 2011.

The NJ Department of Education is also planning to phase out the High School Proficiency Test (HSPT) and the Alternative High School Assessments tests. Replacing the current HSPT will be yearly tests in math, language arts, social studies and science in the ninth, tenth and eleventh grades. The new tests will be phased in with students who will be in the eighth grade, during the 2013-2014 school year and become official for students presently in grade four.



The Borough Council approved the Person to Person and Place to Place Liquor License Transfer from Steak and Ale of New Jersey to Konbrothers, Inc. at a special public meeting on May 15.

Steve Koniarelis, president of Konbrothers, Inc., and brother Demetrios own Cafe Everest Diner located at 2002 Park Ave. Renovations to the existing building were completed last year and the diner reopened for business under a new name, Park Avenue Diner.

In December 2011 Konbrothers, Inc. purchased the inactive liquor license previously held by Steak and Ale. Demetrios and attorney Donald Rinaldi came before the borough council to request the liquor license transfer in order to provide liquor to its patrons along with meals.

The borough's ordinance limits liquor sales to within 2,000 feet from an existing liquor business to prevent "undue crowding and concentration" of licensed establishments; however, it also allows for the waiver of this restriction on the basis that the application "renders convenience and service not otherwise available to persons in the area and is an asset to the neighborhood."

Sal Severini, the owner of Sal's Spirit Shoppe located across the street at 1645 Park Ave., was present at the

meeting but did not officially contest the action.

The code's 2,000-foot provision was tested by Paulo's Restaurant located on Plainfield Avenue a few years ago. After undergoing renovations that enlarged its dining area, Paulo's requested a liquor license that was challenged by Witty's Discount Liquors located across the street. The council initially denied the request at its first hearing, but later granted the owners the ability to sell liquor to its customers, stressing the difference in the customer base of each establishment.

The license transfer was approved with the condition that Park Avenue Diner will not have a bar in its building, nor will packaged goods be sold.

In other business, the borough council approved the amount of \$107,147.98 to renew the shared services contract with Middlesex County for the Middlesex County Health Department to provide health services for the borough. Middlesex County currently provides 32 services including environmental programs (pesticide programs), public health inspections (retail food), public health nursing (rape crisis center) and epidemiology and disease surveillance as well as the Local Information and Network and Communications System monitoring.




