

South Plainfield High School Hall of Fame inductees Michael Binder and Thomas Lanza were honored at a special luncheon at Flanagan's Restaurant and Pub on May 22. An induction ceremony was also held that evening during the high school's annual academic awards.

Michael Binder graduated in 1993. He spent one year at the University of Delaware, a year and a half at Middlesex County College and two and a half years at Richard Stockton College, where he graduated in 1998 with a major in political science.

During his last semester at Stockton, Binder interned in Washington, D.C. He stayed in Washington for another year and worked as a membership coordinator.

Binder moved to San Diego, Calif. and worked as a sales representative for Thomas Register. He returned to school to obtain a master's degree in political science at San Diego State University and graduated in 2003. Binder went on to pursue a PhD in political science to become a professor and was accepted at the University of California, San Diego where he graduated in 2010. While studying for his PhD he was asked to become a research fellow at the Lane Center located on the campus of Stanford. Shortly after, Binder was asked to work as a research fellow for the Hoover Institute at Stanford.

In August 2011, Binder accepted a position as assistant professor of political science at the University of Northern Florida in Jacksonville.

Binder currently resides in Florida and has signed a contract with the Hoover Institute as a visiting scholar.

Thomas Lanza went to Sacred Heart School, now Holy Savior Academy, in South Plainfield and graduated from South Plainfield High School in 1973. He graduated from Seton Hall University in 1977 with a double major in English and secondary education. (Continued on page 10)

# Annual Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics NJ

More than 3,000 dedicated law enforcement officers will participate in the 29th annual Torch Run for Special Olympics New Jersey on Friday, June 8 beginning as early as 4:45 a.m.

The 26-leg journey will bring the Special Olympics New Jersey "Flame of Hope" a distance of more than 900 miles through the state to The College of New Jersey in Ewing where it will light the cauldron Friday evening and officially open the 2012 Special Olympics New Jersey Summer Games.

The goal of the Torch Run is to raise funds and awareness for Special Olympics New Jersey as the torch makes its way through more than 300 communities throughout the state.

For the first time, the public can track the Torch Run in real-time on June 8 by logging on to www.TrackTheTorchNJ.org. Torch Run support vehicles will be outfitted with GPS units that will display current torch locations, enabling users to find photo opportunities along the route by showing approximate arrival times. The tool will also allow the public to plan for possible traffic delays.

More than 2,300 athletes will compete at the Summer Games at The College of New Jersey the weekend of June 8-10. Events include aquatics, bocce, gymnastics, powerlifting, softball, tennis and track and field. Law enforcement officers will volunteer their time at the Summer Games.

# Walk with Us to Find a Cure"

Based on estimates from The American Cancer Society, about 43,920 people will be diagnosed with pancreatic cancer this year. And of that number, nearly 37,390 of those individuals will die from the disease. Since 2004, the rates of this form of cancer have increased about 1.5% per year.

Though perhaps not as present in the media as some other forms of cancer, pancreatic cancer is no less deadly. This type of cancer spreads rapidly and is often difficult to detect in its early stages. Because symptoms may not appear until pancreatic cancer is quite advanced, it often has a poor prognosis, even when it is diagnosed early.

To raise community awareness about this disease and to help raise funds to aid research, the Middlesex County Office of Health Services and the Middlesex County Cancer Coalition are sponsoring the fourth annual Pancreatic Cancer Walk

This family event is scheduled to be held from 9 to 11:30 a.m. on Saturday, June 9 at Roosevelt Park in Edison by the lake. Check-in time is 8:30 to 9 a.m. Registration is \$10, and donations are encouraged. Proceeds will benefit pancreatic cancer research at the Cancer Institute of New Jersey (CINJ).

I urge residents to come and join us for a morning walk to support a great cause

Over the past three years, Middlesex County has raised over \$8,200 to benefit pancreatic cancer research at the CINJ. That funding was put toward a pancreatic cancer clinical trial earlier this year that tested the effectiveness of new vaccine combinations and immune response. This year our goal is to raise \$10,000.

The more we learn about how to treat pancreatic cancer, the more people we can save from this devastating disease.




The ceremonies concluded at the American Legion where SPHS student Corey Singer sang the National Anthem and SPHS student Madison Miller sang *Amazing Grace*.

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

At this year's meet, medals were awarded to first, second and third place finishers in all events except the relays, where ribbons were awarded to second and third place finishers. All four participating schools took home medals or ribbons.

"Our club looks forward each year to this special service project," said Townley. "Rotary International's motto is 'Service Above Self'. We truly enjoy providing this service to these fine young athletes and presenting them an opportunity to win medals or ribbons for their athleticism."

The track and field meet is normally held at the Hub Stine Athletic Field in Plainfield. Due to pending construction, it was not available this year.

"We are grateful to Athletic Director Al Czech and his coaching staff and to district administration for allowing us to use the Frank Jost Field," said Townley. "The athletes and the volunteers all enjoyed the beautiful facilities, and we appreciated the help given by Coach Steve Johnston in setting up for the events and the South Plainfield athletes in returning everything to storage."

The Rotary Club expects to offer the 86th annual Track and Field Meet next year at the Plainfield site. The public is welcome and encouraged to attend and support the young athletes.

In next week's spotlight match, Twin City Pharmacy will have the unusual challenge of not giving away a lot of strokes when they take on Unique Sports Accessories.



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




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Christopher Franco enjoys riding his specialized tricycle.

# **Specialized Tricycles Donated to Special Students**

Six special needs South Plainfield students received specialized tricycles donated by AMBUCS, a national service organization dedicated to providing mobility and independence for people with disabilities. Another "tryke" was donated to the special education preschool program. Six trykes were donated by AMBUCS to school district children in 2010, and two were received back in 2005.

Helping residents obtain these trykes for their children is Board of Education Physical Therapist Consultant Bala Pillai, who has more than 20 years experience in the field.


"As a pediatric physical therapist, I feel that in this day and age of increased TV watching and computer-based games, our children are at an even greater risk for health-related problems, and that risk increases exponentially for students with special challenges, both visible-such as Cerebral Palsy, Down Syndrome, etc., and not visible-as in Autistic Spectrum Disorders," said Pillai.

The trykes are provided by AmTryke, LLC, a sister company of AMBUCS. AmTryke offers foot cycles, hand cycles and combination hand/foot powered cycles. To ensure a proper fit, the trykes can be adapted in many ways including frame size, seat selection, trunk and leg support. This makes them ideal for individuals with a variety of special needs. "Parents of children with disabilities

want to give their kids every opportu-nity to lead a full life," said Pillai. "I have had the opportunity to provide customized tricycles to 12 of my students in the past seven years through donations from a Pennsylvania chapter of AM-BUCS. The feedback that I have received from the families makes me love what I do for a profession even more."

Resident Rene Franco's eight yearold son, Christopher, has an "unseen" disability and says that he has always found it a challenge to find outdoor toys for him. "I am very grateful that my son got his first tryke at age eight and can finally engage in outdoor activities with the rest of the family," said Franco. "Having the push bar at the back takes care of my back as I help my son develop his tryke riding skills at home. Thanks to his physical therapist Ms. Pillai for making us aware of this opportunity. It was a long ride but worth it judging from the way my son lights up every time we mention 'bike' to him."

Pillai states, "Children diagnosed with mild to moderate degrees of these 'unseen' disabilities-not immediately visible to the onlooker-are the ones who usually tend to fall between the cracks. They look like their typically developing peers, but their movement ABC's (agility, balance and coordination) comes in the way of them keeping up with their peers during family outings, school recess and physical education class." This area started to be occupied, or settled, by Europeans in the 1660s, many of whom moved here for religious freedom. Because they were still British subjects, they were supposed to belong to the Church of England, or as many called it, "Henry's Church," after King Henry VIII.

These early settlers did not want to belong to "Henry's Church." There were other nationalities too, such as Dutch, French and Scandinavian. As time moved on these groups banded together to form town and villages. Woodbridge and Piscataway townships were early consolidated areas. Many of our modern road systems followed early Indian trails. Maple Avenue and Old Raritan Road through South Plainfield were a part of the main route from Elizabeth to New Brunswick.

Kattlin Diaz's four and a half year old daughter, Sabrina, can now ride her tryke along with friends. "It helps her feel like she is one of the kids," said Diaz. Sabrina has been riding the tryke for almost a year now. "I value the importance of fitness and wellness being a karate teacher myself," said Diaz. "My daughter was diagnosed with Cerebral Palsy which makes it difficult for her to walk and move around easily; something that most kids would think nothing of. As a mother I would like to give her as many opportunities that any child growing up would have."

When Sabrina was given a tricycle at age two and a half years old she could not ride it because her feet kept slipping off and it was a challenge. "When Ms. Pillai informed us of the opportunity to give her a customized tricycle as a Christmas gift we jumped at the opportunity," Diaz said.

"She loved the tryke from day one and her reaction was well worth the long drive to Pennsylvania twice; once to have her fitted and then to pick it up."

Thanks to Pam from AMBUCS and Pillai, Sabrina rode the tryke last summer and it gave the family great joy to see her laughing and riding alongside her cousins enjoying the summer breeze. "The tryke is great because it has the adaptations that she needs to ride it, she has foot straps to ensure that her feet stay on the pedals and don't keep slipping out and it also makes it very easy for us as it is designed so that we don't break our backs as we encourage her to ride the tryke," said Diaz.

"Having Cerebral Palsy does not mean that Sabrina cannot have a good quality of life and I am thankful that we are able to provide her with yet another motivating and fun activity," said Diaz. "Recently we found out that she has started using the regular

tricycle in the preschool gym with the help of Ms. Butrico, Ms. Pintauro and Ms. Riccardi."

There is currently no AMBUCS chapter in New Jersey. Pillai, along with family members, drive to Pennsylvania to pick up their donated trykes. "When we open a New Jersey chapter, our students will have a place to go locally whenever AMBUCS has an open house, instead of driving for more than two hours," said Pillai. "The fun and freedom of riding your own bike is something everyone should be able to enjoy. Now, thanks to the AmTryke therapeutic tricycle, even individuals who are unable to operate a traditional bike can finally realize this wonderful experience."
