# **Council Approves Budget; Taxes on the Rise**

The Borough Council voted unanimously to adopt the final 2012 budget at a special meeting held on Monday.

Up \$310,000 from 2011, this year's budget total is \$26,590,959. The tax levy, however, is down \$427,828 to \$17,892,867. State aid also remains flat again at \$2,715,291. The remainder of the anticipated revenue to cover the \$26M will come in the form of miscellaneous monies, including court and construction permit fees as well as other sources.

New businesses, such as Progressive Insurance and PSE&G, as well as smaller store front businesses moving into the borough have contributed to an increase in permit fees. According to Economic Committee Chair Councilman Alex Barletta, the biggest revenue increase this year came from construction permit fees, which in just seven months are higher than they were in all of 2011. "We're seeing quite a few new businesses come to town," said Barletta. "This means increased ratables and job growth." \$1,416,666,865. Council President Ray Rusnak blames reduced ratables on the real estate market as an ongoing concern. "Like other towns, we're seeing a record number of tax appeals," said Rusnak.

Healthcare costs for employees are on the rise as in previous years; however, pension payments are down \$254,575. Governor Chris Christie's healthcare and pension reform for government employees enacted in 2011 will see healthcare costs take a slower drop than pensions, which will all level out eventually.

The new municipal tax rate of 1.293-up from 1.261 in 2011-will see the average home assessed at \$122,900 increase by \$39.33 a year. Overall, taxpayers will see a 2.5% increase from 2011 to 2012 in the municipal portion of their tax bill as compared to the county tax, which rose by 3.2% over the same period. The Open Space tax is down this year by 3.5%, and school taxes increased 2.5%. The entire tax bill will show an increase of \$158.54 a year per household. The borough's recent bond refinancing also saved money for taxpayers. "We're looking at a \$200,000 savings," said CFO Glenn Cullen.

As is the case with other towns, the largest part of the budget is salaries, which were up 1.1% over 2011, but were about equal to where they were four years ago.

The Library Board of Trustees contributed \$146,302 of their coffers back into last year's budget for tax relief. According to Rusnak, he has made attempts to obtain monies again to aid in this year's budget, but has yet to receive a response from the library board.

In March, Rusnak also appealed to the Board of Education to cover their 57% share of \$280,000 in tax appeals last year. "Refunds go back to the residents out of the borough's budget only and we don't come back (Continued on page 11)

# **Borough Resident Needs Kidney Donation**

A South Plainfield resident who wishes to be identified by her first name, Christy, has been battling chronic kidney disease since 2009, and is now looking beyond family and friends for a donor.

Christy has lived in the borough for the past 10 years and is a former elementary school teacher. The 35 year-old wife and mother of three children ages nine, seven and four, was diagnosed with Stage 4 Focal Segmental Glomerulosclerosis (FSGS) after experiencing severe migraine headaches. FSGS is a cause of Nephrotic Syndrome, a nonspecific disorder in which the kidneys are damaged. There is no known cause or cure, and treatment options are limited.

"While searching for a donor, I've been taking immunosuppressive drugs to slow the progression of FSGS," explained Christy. "I'm also receiving regular, painful injections for severe anemia present in the final stage of kidney disease. Despite all efforts, the disease is rapidly progressing; my kidneys are failing, and my doctors are stressing the importance of having a donor ready as soon as possible."

Anyone in good health with blood type O (positive or negative) can be tested. Compatible live donor transplants, in which blood type and genetic make-up between donor and recipient match well, are the gold standard of kidney transplant procedures. Potential kidney donors must undergo extensive testing and interviews to determine eligibility to donate.

Potential donors must be between the ages of 18 and into their 70s, are in overall good health, preferably immunologically compatible with the recipient and free of diseases, such as cancer, HIV or Hepatitis C. Donors may be blood relatives of *(Contined on page 11)*

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# **Brett Temple Cast in Summer Production**



Want to help conserve water during a drought, such as this one, but hesitate to

completely abandon lawn care? With the following tips, you can minimize use of the water supply while still maintaining a yard of healthy, green grass.

First, reduce the use of fertilizer, which makes lawns need more water, or avoid using it until autumn (which is the most crucial time for fertilizing, anyway). Instead, aerate the lawn to let water flow deeper into the ground to help the roots grow.

Next, adjust how you mow. Sharpen your lawnmower's blades, because dull blades can damage the grass, making it require 40 to 60 percent more water while recovering. After you finish mowing, leave the clippings on the grass to help slow the evaporation of water from the lawn.

Finally, rethink how you water. If you use sprinklers, make sure that there are no leaky valves or other problems that may decrease efficiency

are, and water only to the depth of the roots. (Please note, however, that this method is recommended only during a drought-under normal conditions, it is best to water a minimum of one inch per week, which may be done all at once or under a variety of regimens. Deep watering promotes a healthy root system, which helps turf tolerate drought.) Thy to water between 4 and 9 a.m. to avoid heat that can make the water evaporate faster, and, if possible, save 40 to 50 percent more water by doing so every other day rather than every day.


However, needless to say, if your town is limiting water use, follow the limits. They're there for a reason!





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

the recipient or they may be unrelated. Better genetic and immunologic matches help reduce the risk of organ rejection. A kidney from a perfectly matched sibling donor can function for an average of 35 years, while less perfectly matched kidneys function for 20 years on average.

So far, there have been no matches for Christy of the 10 people tested. A donor questionnaire can be filled out and sent by fax to New York Presbyterian Hospital (NYP) at (212) 342-0843. It is important to have the process started as soon as possible since donors are thoroughly screened which takes time. All expenses will be billed to Christy; not the donor nor to their insurance carrier.
