Public Works Agrees to **New Contract**

The Borough Council voted unanimously at the August 20 meeting to accept a new three-year contract with the Department of Public Works (DPW) employees. The contract includes a 1.5% hourly salary increase this year and next; in 2013 there will be a 1.75% increase.

After their four-year contract ended in December 2010, a one-year extension was granted with new lower base salary rates for the different classifications of workers. The town felt at the time that the pay scale exceeded what the current job market for similar positions called for.

In the new contract, a "Laborer IV" step was added and prescription co-pays increased.

Most state employees, local government and education employees are now paying 1.5% or greater of their base salaries toward healthcare premiums, and it will increase each year by a large margin through 2015. This is due to Governor Chris Christie's legislation that was passed last June. Essentially, DPW workers who earn more than \$35,000 a year will be hit with the highest percentage.

"This contract was a home run for the borough," commented CFO Glenn Cullen.

There are 16 full time employees; half of whom were hired after the December 7, 2009 date when the lower base rates took effect.



Borough Refunds \$347,300 in Tax Appeals

The Borough Council refunded \$147,808.98 in tax appeal judgments to 83 residential property owners and four commercial property owners at August 20 meeting.

According to Borough CFO Glenn Cullen, the town budgeted \$300,000 this year to return to taxpayers in anticipated refunds-\$100,000 more than last year.

Most of the tax appeals result in a credit towards next year's bill; however, if the property owner has overpaid for the year the borough issues a monetary refund. So far this year the borough has exceeded the budgeted amount and accumulated \$347,300 in tax appeal judgments. The differ-

ence will come from the uncollected tax portion of the budget which has an additional \$150,000 in it and any additional appeals over and above will be taken from the borough's surplus.

"I don't want to sit here and say we've seen the worst," commented Mayor Matt Anesh. "I hope we have. It seems brighter going forth. I think we've weathered it pretty well."

Going forward, Councilman Alex Barletta feels that the future construction of the 550 unit Celebrations project at the former Tingley Rubber site on South Avenue will have a positive impact on tax ratables. "It should help," said Barletta. "We are doing our job fiscally. South Plainfield is in pretty good shape." The borough is currently down approximately \$1.5M in its tax

base this year and has been on a steady decline for the past several years.

Council President and Finance Chair Ray Rusnak has approached the Board of Education several times this year attempting to collect \$158,000 in 2011 tax appeals to offset what the borough had to refund on their behalf. With the board's share of the total tax bill being approximately 57%, the borough has had to absorb \$196,692 of the \$347,300 so far this year in tax appeal refunds.

According to Rusnak, after meeting with Cullen, Superintendent Dr. Stephen Genco, Business Administrator Jim Olobardi, Board President Jim Giannakis and board member John Farinella they have agreed to discuss and vote on the issue at their Wednes-

"The borough can't support it [tax appeals]," said Rusnak. "The Board of Education should help chip in."

Money that is paid out in tax appeals on behalf of the county is also not refunded to the borough.

School board member Joseph Sorrentino commented at the meeting that he does not feel that the board owes the town any money in tax relief to assist with the tax appeals. Yet he believes that something can be worked out with sharing the cost of school crossing guards, which the borough is obligated to fund at \$300,000 a year.

Property taxes are the result of the local budget process and may not be appealed; however, the property's



Rob Bengivenga and Dick Frank Focus on Results

As they start their reelection campaign, Councilmen Rob Bengivenga and Dick Frank are asking voters to look at their record of results when voting in this year's election.

"Total spending is up less than one percent in three years," explained Frank. "This is despite big increases in pension and healthcare costs.

The two also noted how in 2010 the council cut its part of the tax bill by \$178 and how most of that tax cut remains intact. "The municipal part of the tax bill is still \$99 less than in 2009 when the Democrats ran things," said Bengivenga.

Putting the "Care" Back into Healthcare

What is the first thing that comes to mind when you hear someone has had a stroke? If you're like most people, you feel sorry for the person and think that if they survive it, they may end up severely debilitated and maybe even need to be institutionalized.

These used to be my thoughts also. I am a physical therapist and when I was in therapy school 25 years ago, we were taught that once someone had a stroke, we had a small window of opportunity to try to restore a person's function and then there wasn't much we could do beyond that. Not a real hopeful picture. But due to recent advances in stroke research, my perspective and practice has changed dramatically. Now when I hear that someone has had a stroke, I still feel bad for the person, but the predominant word that comes to my mind is hope. We have hope for several reasons.

We have hope because we now know that even though part of the brain dies when a stroke occurs, we know that the brain has the amazing ability to "teach" other parts of the brain to carry out the functions that were lost due to the stroke damage. So as long as a person has the motivation to get better and is fully participating in a good recovery program, they can continue to improve

their function for a very long time.


We have hope because doctors, therapists and nurses are now able to put into practice what researchers have learned. New technologies and training techniques are now available to therapists in every setting and continue to expand almost every day. Some of these include technologies such as Locomotor Retraining for walking, Bioness dynamic orthoses for the arm and leg to restore muscle control, robotic retraining tools for arm function and walking, Constraint Movement Therapy which retrains arm function, Vital-Stim for swallowing problems, cognitive rehabilitation assessment and treatment tools, just to name a few. Within each of these categories are a variety of products, tools and training available for the clinician. What this means to us is that more patients have access to what used to be only available to a few. This leads to more people being able to recover their functional

mobility and return to productive, meaningful lives.

We have hope because we now know that there is no "window of opportunity" to recover from a stroke, but recovery can take place for as long as the person is willing to build in recovery as a lifestyle. This is not easy and requires a great deal of perseverance at times, but when we look at the choice between a wheelchair and walking or a choice between having someone assist with getting dressed and diligently practicing a new approach to be more independent with dressing, for most of us, the choice is easy-we want to be as good as we can be! The human spirit is amazing-if we have hope, we can accomplish most anything. So, here's to HOPE in stroke recovery!







Affordable Home Improvements Grants Available

The borough has announced that it is now accepting names to participate in the South Plainfield Home Improvement Program for low and moderate income families.

The program, provided to Middlesex County through the Council on Affordable Housing (COAH), is available for owner-occupied singlefamily homes.

To be eligible to participate, your gross annual income (pre-tax income) for all household members must be less than: one person household-\$58,016, two person household-\$66,304, three person household-\$74,592, four person household-\$82,880, five person household-\$89,510, six person household-\$ 96,141, seven person household-\$102,771 and an eight person household-\$109,402.

For households seeking a determination of income eligibility, all wage earners 18 years of age or older in the household must submit appropriate documentation documenting the household income which includes a copy of the deed to the property, proof that taxes are current and proof of property insurance including liability, fire and flood insurance where necessary

The purpose of the program is to bring substandard housing up to code. Substandard units are those units requiring repair or replacement of at least one major system including the following: roof, plumbing (including wells), HVAC, electrical, sanitary plumbing (including septic systems), load bearing structural systems, lead paint abatement and weatherization such as building insulation for an attic, exterior walls and crawl space, siding to improve energy efficiency, replacement storm windows and storm doors and replacement windows and doors. Code violations will be determined by an inspection conducted by a licensed

Additional work may include interior trim, interior and/or exterior doors, including storm doors, interior and/or exterior hardware, interior stair repair, exterior step repair or replacement, porch repair, wall surface repair, painting and exterior rain carrying system or replacement.

Up to \$17,500 per unit may be available for improvements to eligible owner-occupied units.

The rehabilitation program is designed as a forgivable loan. Any homeowner who participates in the program will be required to execute a mortgage and mortgage note which will place a conditional lien on the

home by the borough for 10 years. If the owner remains in the home for that time period the loan is forgiven and the lien is removed from the property. If the title is transferred before then, repayment of the loan will be pro-rated depending on the number of years the loan has been in use. The percentage owed will be the full amount through the fifth year; 80% in year six; 65% in year seven; 50% in year eight and 25% in the ninth year.

Should the owner decide to sell the property, transfer title, or pass away before the terms of the lien have expired, the heirs, executors, or representatives must notify the South Plainfield Planning Department. The heirs would be obligated to repay the loan based on the prorated schedule. The only exception is if the beneficiary inherits the home and meets the required incomeeligibility guidelines and resides in the home. In this case the loan would remain forgiven.

The municipality may agree to the subordination of a loan if the mortgage company supplies an appraisal showing that the new loan plus the balance on the old loan does not exceed 95% of the appraised value of the property.

Upon confirmation of income eligibility, the program staff will schedule a housing inspection. Income eligibility will remain valid for six months. If the applicant has not signed a contract for rehabilitation within six months of the date of the letter of certifying eligibility, the applicant will be required to update

Monies for this program have been made available through local new construction builder contributions to the COAH Trust Fund.

To be placed on the waiting list or for any questions, call Affordable Housing Administrators President Maureen Fullaway at (732) 892-4292 between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. Names will be accepted until Friday, Aug, 31. A lottery will be held at a future date to determine the order in which households will be served.





Possible Outbreak of West Nile Virus

reporting large numbers of West Nile Virus (WNV) cases; the virus is being blamed for illness and deaths. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), this is the worst outbreak in many years.

It is not yet known whether New Jersey will be the next state to get hit hard by this outbreak, but we caution the public to be alert and take measures to prevent becoming a victim. Since the WNV is spread from mosquitoes to humans, the NJ Poison Experts suggest the following safety tips:

· When the weather permits, wear long-sleeved, loose-fitting shirts and long pants whenever outdoors. Pants should be tucked into socks or boot tops to help keep insects from reaching the skin.

· Limit outdoor activities at dawn, dusk, and the early evenings when mosquitoes are most active. Exposure to mosquitoes can be decreased simply by limiting time spent outdoors.

· Eliminate standing water that

Several states across the country are collects in birdbaths, flower pots, swimming pool covers, buckets and containers, pet food and water dishes, tires, barrels, unused pools and roof gutters. Standing (stagnant) water can be the perfect breeding grounds for mosquitoes.

 Install or repair window and door screens to prevent mosquitoes from getting indoors.

· Apply 10% to 35% DEET (N,Ndiethyl-meta-toluamide) containing insect repellent to clothes and exposed skin when taking part in outdoor activities. DEET is available in many formulations including lotions, solutions, creams, gels, sprays and towelettes. Insect repellents should not be sprayed on the face since they may irritate the eyes and mouth. Instead, spray onto hands and then rub onto the face. Insect repellants are not suggested for very young children (less than three years old) and application

to broken skin or wounds should be avoided, but can be applied to clothing. Concentrations above 15% should be applied to clothing rather than skin. Insect repellents must be reapplied, as per the directions, at intervals.

According to Dr. Bruce Ruck, director of drug information at NJPIES, "Application of DEET should be according to the specific directions on the product used. Some products can be applied to the skin, while others are intended for application to clothing, sleeping bags, tents, etc. Spraying DEET on clothes is suggested because mosquitoes may bite through

Redistricting Task Force Meets Again

By Libby Barsky

In June, the Board of Education requested that a redistricting task force be formed made up of school staff, board members and residents to study the effectiveness of the district's current grade configuration model. Former Interim Superintendent Dr. Gary Bowen and his partner, Dr. Lisa Antunes, an assistant superintendent in Hillsborough, had been asked by Board President Jim Giannakis to conduct a study at a cost of \$15,000.

At its first meeting last month, approximately 40 people met to assess the district's pre-kindergarten through middle school enrollment configuration and consider recommendations for

possible future modification.

Different variables were discussed with the audience contributing the pros and cons of each suggested change in the grade levels housed within each of the schools.

On August 14 the redistricting task force met again with nearly 25 people attending. Numerous options were discussed such as returning the four elementary schools to kindergarten through fifth grade or moving the sixth graders to the middle school which would cause overcrowding either way. Housing only one grade at Grant Elementary School would mean that there would be unused space.

A vote was taken on each of the various configurations presented by

Bowen. The audience overwhelmingly endorsed keeping the current configuration, however possibly moving the boundaries of existing neighborhood schools. The boundary request was emphasized by Transportation Supervisor Marlene Steele who was concerned about the amount of children potentially attending Roosevelt School when the proposed 550 apartment unit complex at the former Tingley Rubber site on South Avenue is completed. The project has been on hold for over five years and there are no plans on the drawing table as of yet.

The task force will meet one last time on Tuesday, Sept. 11 and Bowen will present its recommendations to the board during the October meeting.





Borough Refunds \$347,300 in Tax Appeals

(Continued from page 1) assessment can be. An assessment is an opinion of value by a licensed professional such as an appraiser. For an assessed value to be considered excessive or discriminatory, it must be proven that the assessment does not fairly represent either the true market value or "common level range" standard.

True market value is the borough's assessment of any property at a given time. The borough has not done a borough-wide re-evaluation in approximately 30 years. Common level range is what happens subsequently to affect the value due to inflation, recession, appreciation or depreciation. Physical deterioration may also change a property's value.

Assessment postcards are mailed to property owners the end of January. This statutory requirement is intended to inform property owners of their assessment for the current year. If a property owner does not agree with their assessment, they may confer with the tax assessor and file an appeal. The appeal deadline is April 1 of that year. Proof required to challenge a tax assessment must be dated prior to October 1 of the previous year.

The county tax board compares a property's true market value to the

assessed value during an appeal. If the ratio of the assessed value to true value exceeds or falls below the average ratio by 15% the assessment is reduced to the common level; however, if the assessment falls within this common level range, no adjustment is made.

Tax appeals that are denied can be appealed within 45 days from the date the judgment decision was mailed.

Special rules do apply to commercial properties. Owners of rental income properties must supply an income statement when filing an appeal. Net income generated by a property has a direct bearing on the ability to market the property and, therefore, its value. Appeals by a business entity, other than a sole proprietor, partnership or corporation, require representation by an attorney.

A tax appeal hearing must be held within three months of the April 1 filing deadline.

"I'm not sure a re-evaluation is the answer currently," said Rusnak when asked if the borough should consider one. "The cost is extremely expensive, and if you think back a few years, if we had done one back when real estate was at its highest, we would probably have tripled the amount of tax appeals we are currently experiencing. I look around at other towns locally and compared to them I think we have

managed the situation very well." Rusnak estimates that a re-evaluation could cost the borough approximately

"We plan to continually monitor the environment and will consider all options," said Anesh. "However, as the council president mentioned, the cost of conducting a town wide revaluation would be significant. In addition, it is unlikely the process would eliminate 100% of tax appeals in the future."

To date this year, the borough has paid nearly \$37,000 in legal fees to attorneys DiFrancesco, Bateman, Coley, Yospin, Kunzman, Davis, Lehrer & Flaum, P.C. for representation in tax

Also on the agenda for that evening was a Chestnut Street resident receiving a cancellation of his future property taxes and a refund for qualifying as a 100% disabled veteran under state law, and \$2,939.28 was returned to the owner of 1409 Clinton Avenue pursuant to a reduction in the assessed value. The property was the site of the devastating fire that killed five people in February. In addition, two property owners were issued \$308 in refunds for overpayment of taxes which occurs due to the timing of mortgage refinancing or home purchases.




