Local Scout Attains Rank Of Eagle

Council Votes for Sharing Burden of Tax Appeals

The Borough Council voted unanimously to support Assembly Bill A-1503 and Senate Bill S-1896 regarding proposed legislation to require fire districts, school districts and county governments to pay their fair share of tax appeal refunds and settlements at the September 4 meeting.

The vote came after the council received a letter from the Board of Education denying their request to return over \$350,000 toward tax appeal refunds that were paid out over the past two years on their behalf. The decision was agreed upon by the BOE at the August 29 meeting. The letter stated: "At this time we are unable to honor your request."

On May 14, Senator Anthony Bucco (R-Morris) introduced Bill S-1896 which would require county governments, school districts, fire districts and other taxing districts to share in the burden of paying for property tax refunds. Under current law, only the county shares in this burden with municipalities through the county tax equalization process. The bill requires the municipal tax collector to send a notice of the pro rata share of the property tax appeal refunds paid by the municipality during the tax year to the county, school districts and fire districts for inclusion into their annual budgets. In the year following the tax year in which the refunds were paid, the municipal tax collector is then

required to deduct the applicable pro rata share of the property tax refunds from the amounts to be paid to the county and each school district and fire district as required by N.J.S.40A:14 79, R.S. 54:4 74 and R.S.54:4 75.

In January 2009, Bucco was appointed Republican Budget Officer of the Senate and is the ranking Republican member of the Budget and Appropriations Committee.

According to Council President Ray Rusnak, "Since the board won't do it [return the money] voluntarily, we are in full support of the bill that is in Trenton. Hopefully, they will pass it and enforce it." He has also been in contact with Governor Chris Christie's office in regard to the fact that despite the Board of Education showing a \$1.3M excess surplus last year they received an additional \$700,000 this year in state aid. When Christie first took office in 2010, the aid was slashed by \$700,000 and the BOE used \$1.2M in excess surplus toward the budget.

Handlers, Dogs to Begin Training Next Week

The two new South Plainfield Police German Shepherd K-9 dogs arrived last Thursday and will begin training on September 17 with their new handlers, Officers Mike Grasso and Mark Bullock, at the training facility at the Union County Sheriff's Office.

The dogs will aid officers in solving burglaries, recovering evidence, facility searches, locating missing persons, serving warrants and making arrests. They are also intended to be

the department's "good will ambassador" and their presence will create a positive connection between the public and police.

Cages will be purchased for the dogs from Triangle Communications, LLC of Scotch Plains at a cost of \$9,240.68 along with the installation of electronics and equipment for two patrol vehicles priced at \$25,583.60.

The specially bred dogs were born in Hungary and purchased through Birkenhof Kennels of Derby, Conn. for \$12,400.

Both the borough and the police department are currently accepting donations and any open grants to help offset the K-9 unit's startup costs. Corporate or private donations would be graciously appreciated.

The police department also held a dog naming contest for elementary school children from kindergarten through sixth grade. Students were asked to submit a name and why they chose it. The winner or winners will be announced during the upcoming week and will also be recognized at a future borough council meeting.

Rich from Presto Printing donated the materials (paper and printing) for the naming contests.

The truck will be at the community pool parking lot from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m., or until it fills up. This is a new location and was chosen because it has more room for vehicles to queue than does the Senior Center.

Do not bring books, magazines, newspapers or anything made of plastic. These should be placed at the curb in the blue recycling box or brought to the borough's recycling center on Kenneth Avenue.

Lewis lives in Plainfield and has five children and 12 grandchildren. In his retirement he plans to go fishing and visit his relatives down south. His last day was September 4.

Road Paving Projects Approved

The borough will be paving several streets and installing speed tables along three roads within the next couple of months.

Fifteen hundred tons of asphalt will be purchased at the current tonnage price of the Middlesex County Co-op Program from Stavola Construction of Tinton Falls in an amount not to exceed \$110,000.

Fischer Contracting Inc. of Scotch Plains provided the lowest bid at \$67,371.25 which will include daily rental of an HMA paver with one operator and two men and a vibratory roller with one operator. They will also be milling the roads to be paved and expedite milling for the speed table placement. Signage consisting of 14 combination speed hump signs, six "Speed Hump Ahead" signs and 16 speed table traffic markings will also

be provided by Fischer.

Department of Public Works equipment and its employees along with equipment from the Middlesex County Co-Op will be used to complete the project. According to CFO Glenn Cullen, by utilizing the borough's equipment and manpower they are saving approximately \$100,000 as opposed to bidding out the entire project. The borough is also considering paving Susan Terrace and Brenda Place with the potential savings.

Roads to be paved are E. Nassau Avenue, E. Elmwood Drive, Caffrey Terrace, W. 8th Street and Oak Tree Avenue from the post office to Front Street. A total of eight speed tables will be placed throughout Fairmount Avenue, West Street and W. 8th Street. One table on Oak Tree Avenue will be replaced.

Bids for repaving Sampton Avenue and Nunnick Lane bids were received last week. Both projects should be completed by late October early November.

Our ratable base is now equivalent to what it was in 2002 in large part because of tax appeals by commercial property owners. Appeals approved by the Republicans and Democrats.

What have our politicians done to fix this? Not much. The Republican council shrugs their shoulders and says there is nothing they can do.

But there are things that we can do. If given the opportunity to serve, this is an area that I will work to rectify. By bringing more businesses to South Plainfield we can raise the ratable base and lower taxes.

Heroes of 9/11 Honored at Middle School Ceremony

Students, staff, administrators, board members, borough officials and members of the police and fire departments came together on Tuesday in the Middle School courtyard to pay tribute to the nearly 3,000 people who lost their lives during the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks.

Curriculum Coordinator Paul Rafalowski welcomed the crowd. The National Anthem was played by the school's clarinet ensemble led by music teacher, Andy Veiss.

Principal Kevin Hajduk gave opening remarks and explained that students would be learning about a man named Welles Crowther, also known as the "Man with the Red Bandana," during lunch that day. He had worked for Sandler O'Neill Partners on the 104th floor of the South Tower of the World Trade Center. Witnesses reported that after the plane hit, Crowther, with a red bandana covering his mouth and nose to protect him from debris, re-entered the building

at least three times to rescue people. He is directly responsible for saving the lives of at least 12 people.

Hajduk also remarked that seventh grade student Joe Lanzetta's Uncle Frank was an FDNY fire chief who saved over 40 lives that day. He eventually passed away due to complications from exposure to the toxic debris.

"Learn to give a hand to each other every day," said Hajduk. "It's time to remember the victims and celebrate the heroes.'

Student Emily Kuchinski read a piece by Bill Holicky called, They Took a Vote, and Thomas Licato read the poem entitled, I Am the Flag of the US of America.

Guest speaker Mayor Matt Anesh offered his recollection of the fateful day 11 years ago and his sentiments at the time. "Never forget. If we never forget the past 11 years and we pay tribute to those who answered the call, I am confident that we will be protected in the future," he said.

by Gov. Chris Christie on September 11 proclaiming September 11 Patriot Day and a National Day of Service and Remembrance. Anesh presented Hajduk with his own proclamation from the borough stating the same.

A moment of silence was followed by Taps performed by Tomasz Tarnawski on trumpet and an FDNY Pipes and Drums recording of Amazing Grace.

In closing, Hajduk recognized
