Resident Struck, Killed Sitting in Spring Lake Park

Driver Cites Vehicle Malfunction as Accident Cause

South Plainfield resident Shirley Boguski, 86, was struck by a motor vehicle in Spring Lake Park last Thursday morning while she sat in a lawn chair south of the parking area near Pearl Place. She was dragged about 20 feet across the grass.

Boguski frequented the park daily to

watch people and enjoy the outdoors.

Ty Nguyen, 74, also of South Plainfield, operating a 1996 Toyota, jumped the curb in the parking lot and struck Boguski, who suffered multiple devastating injuries. She was transported via NJ State Police Northstar Medevac Helicopter to Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital in New Brunswick and died a short time later.

Nguyen reported that his vehicle had malfunctioned after being serviced, and that it accelerated suddenly as he was exiting the parking lot.

The vehicle was impounded for a full mechanical inspection. No charges have been filed and the investigation is continuing.

Dems Bow Out of Council Debate

The South Plainfield Observer and the South Plainfield Business Association will co-sponsor the Borough Council candidates debate at a "Meet the Candidates" event on Wednesday, Oct. 17 at 7 p.m. at the Senior Center, 90 Maple Ave.

Six candidates are running for two open seats on the borough council; however, only four of the six candidates will participate in the debate. Republicans Rob Bengivenga and Richard "Dick" Frank and Independents Paul McCullen and Patricia "Pat" DeSantis will be on hand to discuss the issues.

Democratic Chairman Vinnie Buttiglieri has informed the *Observer* that Democrats Franky Salerno and C.J. Diana will not participate in the debate. "I will not allow them [Salerno and Diana] to be subject to the negative attacks that the Republicans are spewing. The people deserve better," he said. When asked to reconsider the decision, Buttiglieri declined.

The candidates participating in the debate were quick to respond to the Democrats' decision.

Independent Paul McCullen com-

mented, "It is disappointing that at a time when there are many issues important to this community they have decided they are above us all and can't be bothered."

According to the "Meet the Candidates" organizers, the debates offer a unique forum that allows voters to hear firsthand the candidates' positions on local issues and will take place with or without the Democratic candidates' participation.

Speaking on behalf of the Republican candidates, Councilman Rob Bengivenga said, "I'm disappointed personally, but I'm also disappointed because residents' questions will go unanswered. If Salerno and Diana were serious candidates, they'd debate us."

"I am disappointed to hear the Democrats are not participating in the debates. The debate is an opportunity for the residents to hear our ideas on how to move South Plainfield forward. I personally look forward to the opportunity to share my views with the residents," said Independent candidate Pat DeSantis.

Residents can submit their questions for the candidates to the Observer prior to the debate by emailing them to spobserver@comcast.net or they can be submitted the evening of the debate. Each candidate will make an opening statement, after which the moderator will decide which questions will be asked and in what order.

Meet the Candidates on October 17 will be the sole opportunity prior to Election Day for candidates to debate and explicate their positions on relevant issues affecting South Plainfield.

The people I speak to on a daily basis do not trust our school board. They believe the BOE is not doing what is best for the town or its children. Many also feel that the BOE does not really want to hear the opinions of the public and would rather tell us what to do instead of trying to work with us. That is something I will fight to change. Elected officials, whether they be the school board, town council or mayor, work for the people and should listen to their opinions, even if we disagree with them.

Let me tell you some of the things I will support should you elect me to

1. I will support giving back the money owed to the town for tax appeals. After all, the BOE is responsible for 57% of the taxes. It is only fair they should pay back the money owed.

For example, if a parent sees a child is struggling in math, which a lot of children do, and the parent is unable to help, they need to contact the teacher and arrange a meeting, where they can try to figure out the best course of action. Teachers also need to be encouraged to speak with the parents as much as possible, especially for struggling students.

I will admit I am not a financial guru by any stretch, but I believe my experience in the corporate world has taught me that you cannot spend more money than you bring in. If you do, your company will not be around very long. I have also learned how to reduce spending and use the resources we do have, more efficiently. I believe many of these principles can be used in the public sector as well.



Board members who are successful on Election Day will take office at the BOE Reorganization Meeting in January.





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



"It's not just attendance, though," added Bengivenga. "He never proposed a single measure to improve the town. And for example, while he says limits and that voters should never offered a single idea for Plainfield and will continue controlling taxes or for reduc-

ing spending. In fact, he was nowhere to be found at budget workshops."

"On a personal level, Franky Salerno is a nice enough young man and I'm sure he wants to do a good job," said Dick Frank. "But his record shows he either won't or can't."

According to both GOP councilmen, voters have a right to judge all the candidates on their records.

"We urge voters to compare the records of the candidates," said Bengivenga. "For the past few weeks, we've been talking about our record and our plans for a better South Plainfield, and over the next few weeks we'll continue to do so. When you compare the records of the candidates, we think you'll see that we're the ones who he wants to keep taxes flat, he are getting it done for South

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
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Restoring Trust...
