# Road Rage Leads to Arrest

An Elizabeth man was arrested following a road rage incident which occurred on May 5 at the intersection of

Durham Ave. and Hadley Rd. Erick Gonzalez, 24, was traveling south on Durham Ave. when he and Jorge Gomez-Morales, 29, of Perth Amboy, were trying to merge into the

vehicles pulled over and an argument ensued.

Gonzalez exited his vehicle with a metal rod and Gomez-Morales emerged with two other male passengers. The three men began to wrestle with Gonzalez and, in self-defense, Gomez-Morales grabbed the rod strik ing Gonzalez twice in the head and ripping his shirt off along with a gold Gomez-Morales's van left the scene and entered Rt. 287, traveling south, and subsequently filed a police report in Perth Amboy. The three men were met there by South Plainfield Police, who then arrested Gonzalez for possession of a weapon and possession of

weapon for unlawful purposes.


Gonzalez was treated at the scene by the South Plainfield Rescue Squad for minor lacerations.


## CORRECTION



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
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
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## Kennedy School Kids Celebrate Grandparents

## AARP Thanks Assemblyman Patrick Diegnan for Vote to Protect Seniors from Fraud

AARP members recognized Assemblyman Patrick Diegnan for the vote in favor of legislation aimed at protecting consumers from the unscrupulous practice of predatory lending. This law will protect New Jersey from the most heinous predatory mortgage lending practices that can financially devastate unsuspecting consumers. Predatory lending practices have increased in the subprime lending market in New Jersey. According to the NJ Institute for Social Justice, foreclosures filings have risen dramatically, increasing 25% in

New Jersey between 1994 and 2000. "Seniors are disproportionately targeted by predatory lenders," said AARP State President Marilyn Askin.

AARP has been advocating for the adoption of this legislation for more than a year. Thousands of seniors have come to Trenton to lobby legislators. In addition, AARP has generated thousands of calls to legislators in support of the legislation.

"New Jersey has passed the strongest consumer protection legislation in the nation. We recognize and appreciate Assemblyman Diegnan's vote for the predatory lending legislation," said Askin.



## **History Walk** at Hillside Cemetery of Samptown

On Saturday, May 24 at I p.m., Larry Randolph, Soouth Plainfield Environmental Commission Chairman and unofficial town historian, will lead a history walk through Hillside Cemetery of Samptown, located on New Market Ave.

The cemetery is the burial site of war veterans from the American Revolution to Vietnam. Randolph will discuss the individuals buried here in the context of South Plainfield's history. Burials possibly began as early as the 1680s. The oldest legible headstone is that of Judge Benjamin Hull, born in 1693 and deceased in 1745. In 1792, the congregation now known as the First Baptist Church of South Plainfield built its first church on the

Randolph, a veteran of the Vietnam War, is a descendant of one of the oldest families in the area. His extensive research has established him as an expert in local and regional history. He has been active in achieving recognition for South Plainfield's war veterans buried at Hillside.
