

BOE Names Oberkehr Assistant Superintendent



Assistant Superintendent of Instruction Fred Oberkehr

Fred Oberkehr was appointed to the position of assistant superintendent of schools for instruction and operations at the December 3 Board of Education meeting at a salary of \$125,000.

Superintendent of Schools Jose Negron noted there were 30 applicants for the position. Oberkehr is replacing Kaye Crown, who retired. Anthony Massaro, who was serving as interim assistant superintendent, was appointed as interim principal of John F. Kennedy Elementary School until a replacement for Oberkehr can be found.

Oberkehr is returning to central administration, where he began in 1995 as coordinator of computer and mathematics technology. As technology coordinator, he applied for and received, on behalf of the district, a \$95,000 grant which enabled the district to install Internet access and increased the number of computers in district schools from eight to 300.

In 2000, he was appointed principal of the middle school with 638 students and 95 faculty. While there, he implemented changes in the mathematics curriculum, introducing classes in algebra and geometry.

"It's not that I was doing what public schools weren't doing, I thought we should be offering algebra and geometry in the middle school. We also started team teaching differentiated instruction and double periods," said Oberkehr.

He credits former Superintendent of Schools Dr. Robert Rosado and Assistant Superintendent of Instruction Kaye Crown for changing the middle school schedule. The restructuring of class schedules to double periods in math and language arts were implemented to provide students with more time to address language arts and math issues and has helped to improve test scores.

Oberkehr also received a \$450,000 Comprehensive School Reform grant over three years to look at curriculum and align it with the New Jersey Core Curriculum Content Standards, allowing the district to uncover and correct gaps.

At the middle school, Oberkehr endorsed the school's ski club and (Continued on page14)

Along with the members of the 101st Airborne Division, attending were members of the VFW, American Legion, Assemblyman Patrick Diegnan, Mayor Charles Butrico and members of the council.

The chartered Airborne's DC-8 had just refueled and was returning home for Christmas from peacekeeping duties in the Middle East when it crashed during takeoff in Gander, Newfoundland.



Councilmembers Seek More Info on **Insurance** Carrier

A resolution which would have committed the Borough to a threeyear contract with the Middlesex County Joint Insurance Fund (MCJIF) was tabled after Republicans Matt Anesh and Rob Bengivenga questioned why MCIIF was chosen when the other bidder, Central Jersey Joint Insurance Fund, seemed to offer more extensive coverage. Both bids were similar in cost, but Anesh commented that if the premiums are comparable, why not choose the one with more coverage? The borough can opt out of the contract at any time, but there is a five percent penalty to do so.

The insurance fund covers the borough for workers compensation, liabilities, property and public officials.

According to Borough Clerk Vinnie Buttiglieri, MCJIF was chosen because of the borough's years of experience with the company, having very few problems with claims. He added that time is running out for the borough to commit on a carrier, since it takes weeks for a new insurance company to do a study and then get the paperwork in order. The present contract expires December 31. Buttiglieri was directed to find out if the borough can get a shorter contract and if the other bidder can do a study in the time left on the old contract.

Families Pledge 10K For Students

Foundation (SPEF) telethon is an annual event at South Plainfield High School. The telethon runs the first week of December.

This year the students efforts resulted in \$10,945 in pledges from the parents of the students of South Plainfield.

The telethon employs volunteer students, between 20-30 per night, to make calls. The money that is pledged can be designated in several ways, including scholarships, incentive programs, and the Emil Leporino Scholarship. Donors also have the option of designating where their donations will be used. About half of

The South Plainfield Education the donations pledged will stay with the foundation, the other half will be dispersed to various areas throughout the district.

Volunteers include many students: National Honor Society members, Peer Leadership, Student Council, band, music and athletics.

Ralph Errico, who works with the student leadership, signed the volunteers up in advance. The foundation usually has four to five members present to oversee the activity and at least one high school administrator as well.

The telethon has grown since it began and two years ago when it set a record with over \$15,000 in pledges. Prior to the telethon,

Off on Bond Ordinance uncil Holds

A \$340,000 bond providing for improvements to Tompkins Avenue and sidewalks on Spicer Avenue was put on hold during last week's Borough Council meeting.

Before the vote for the final adoption was called, Mayor Charles Butrico asked the council for their consensus to hold the ordinance until the new council is seated in January.

A portion of the amount to be bonded was to be used to put side-

walks on Spicer Avenue. The present truck route puts trucks on Spicer Avenue and with no sidewalks, it is dangerous to students and residents. However, if the new council decides to put truck traffic back on Hamilton Boulevard, there may not be a need to put sidewalks on Spicer Avenue.

Councilman Dennis Cerami felt that sidewalks were needed whether trucks are on the road or not saying that the road is also used by residents

when they go to the recycling center and students will still be walking with or without the trucks.

The council voted to table the ordinance.

Dear Editor,

I've been told that 85% of South Plainfield's tax revenues are allocated to the Board of Education. We rarely question where our monies are going; probably because to do so would make us seem as if we were not considerate of the children.

Yet, the Observer's front page story of December 7 should have all of us up in arms. At the December 4 BOE meeting, the Board approved a paid leave until January 28 for the BOE Business Administrator/Board Secretary, who resigned. Two months pay for someone who is no longer working for the city.

Then, at a special meeting, an acting business administrator/board secretary was named at a salary of \$600 per day!

I have to question how our monies are being spent. I am a crossing guard, working to supplement my Social Security to make ends meet; part of that is being used to pay said taxes. (For the record, it takes me a full month, working five days a week, to earn \$600... total!!!)

I'm not sure if that administrator/ secretary position is a full time job, but if it is, using that \$600 a day as a rough guide, in two months that new person will have earned over \$25,000. If the person who resigned was making that same salary, the board will have paid out over \$50,000 to two individuals for two months.

At the pay rates the board is allocating for crossing guards, I estimate that it would take me over 10 years to earn that same amount.

Does no one in government realize that these are our monies they are so frivolously using to lavishly pay salaries? I have to struggle to pay those taxes. Where is the oversight?

You decide when and how often you want the library mate-rials delivered to you. You call your volunteer to set up the days and time of delivery and pick up. This service is called the Edith Goodrich Homebound Delivery service. It is free!

The library is also looking for some-

Grant Students Get Back to Their RockRoots

Dave Fry, lead singer of the band "The History of American Pop Music," performed their RockRoots assembly for Grant School students recently. The award-winning four-piece band entertains and educates school and festival audiences with their unique, live celebration of the history of Rock and Roll.

RockRoots explored the roots of African rhythms, folk dance, Delta Blues, Swing, R&B and Country. They then dove into early Rock and Roll, Doo Wop, Motown, the Beatles, Jimi Hendrix and Disco. The show wrapped up with world music influences and, of course, Hip Hop.

The show was developed by Fry in 1990 and the band has performed at family music festivals, schools, libraries, summer camps, town greens, coffeehouses, and main stage acoustic venues. Fry is one of the very few performers to have performed at every Musikfest in Bethlehem, highlighted by his week-long residency in 1999, performing seven shows, solo and with his bluegrass, RockRoots, Celtic-

rock bands. Fry has three albums to his credit, "Pearls," an adult-oriented folk album featuring blues, swing, Celtic instrumental and folk music; "I Like Peanut Butter," a compilation of children's music and the winner of the Children's Web Music award in 1999 and a new children's music album, "Shake It!," a variety of dance music for children. Fry's PBS-TV show "Play Guitar with Dave Fry," an introduction to the joys of acoustic guitar, was released in 2005, aired on over 150 stations nationally, and still pops up around the country.

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



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

NJ STARS **Program Moves** Ahead in Senate

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The Senate Education Committee released legislation Assemblymen Jack Conners and Patrick Diegnan sponsored that would extend eligibility in the "NJ STARS" college scholarship programs for military personnel if they are called to active duty during their course of studies.

The measure enables members of the military to remain actively enrolled in New Jersey's Student Assistance Rewards Scholarship programs, STARS I and STARS II, while they are on leave to fulfill a military service obligation.

Under current law, NJ STARS I and NJ STARS II require students to maintain continuous fulltime enrollment, although a student may be granted an exception for a leave due to a medical or family emergency.

The measure was part of a 13bill pro-military veteran's agenda the assembly advanced earlier this vear

NJ STARS was the country's first state-sponsored scholarship program designed specifically for community college students. The program offers scholarships to New Jersey's highest-achieving high school students who graduate at the top 20% of their class.

New Jersey also has enacted NJ STARS II, which allows students who graduate from a two-year community college with a 3.0 or higher to continue their education under STARS II at a four-year public college or university in New Jersey. 

Tri-County Red Cross Offers Safety Tips to Prevent Holiday Home Fires

As the holiday season moves into full swing, the Tri-County Red Cross urges families to follow simple safety tips to keep the season merry and to prevent holiday fires. During the winter holiday season the incidence and severity of home fires dramatically increases.

To prevent holiday home fires, the Red Cross recommends keeping all potential fuel sources, including decorations and evergreen trees and wreaths, at least three feet from heat sources such as candles, heat vents, fireplaces and radiators. In addition, holiday lights and candles should be turned off or extinguished before leaving the room or going to bed, and especially before leaving home.

"Last holiday season the Tri-County Red Cross responded to more than 16 home and apartment fires and provided 62 families with immediate emergency assistance including shelter, food, clothing and more," said CEO Nathan Rudy.

The Red Cross recommends the following tips to help prevent holiday home fires: Christmas Tree Care

• Purchase flame retardant metallic or artificial trees.

• If you purchase a real tree, make sure that it has fresh, green needles that aren't easily broken. Keep live trees as moist as possible by giving them plenty of water.

• Use a sturdy tree stand designed not to tip over.

• Keep trees at least three feet away from heat sources, including fireplaces, portable heaters, radiators, heat vents and candles.

 Make sure that any light strings or other decorations for the tree are in good condition and follow manufacturer's instructions for their use. Don't use anything with frayed electrical cords.
 Never put tree branches or needles

in a fireplace or wood burning stove. • Safely dispose of trees as they be-

come dry and needles begin to drop.
Dispose of trees through recycling centers or community pick-up services.
Dried-out trees should not be left at home or in a garage, or placed against

the home or garage.

Holiday Lights and Decorations • Unplug tree and holiday lights be-

fore leaving home or going to bed. • Inspect holiday lights each year for fraved wires, bare spots, broken or

cracked sockets, and excessive wear.Avoid overloading electrical outlets; don't link more than three light strands.

• Use decorations that are flame-resistant or flame-retardant.

• Place decorations at least three feet away from fireplaces, portable heaters, radiators, heat vents and candles.
