Raid Leads to Burglary, Drug Arrests

An investigation into several burglaries in South Plainfield led police to raid a South Plainfield Avenue home on May 30.

Arrested were Stacey Lake, 44 and Garrett Lake, 18 of 174 South Plainfield Ave., Jesse Hay, 18 of 1152 South 10th St. and Brittney Ditmars, 19 of 111 Martin Drive, all in South Plainfield. Jesse Hay and Garrett Lake were charged with burglary and theft

with bail set at \$100,000 with no 10% option. Britney Ditmars was charged with conspiracy to commit burglary and bail was set at \$20,000, also with no 10% option. All three were released after posting bail.

Stacey Lake was charged with possession of a controlled dangerous substance (CDS) and released on her own recognizance.


According to Lt. James Parker of

the criminal investigations division, intelligence gathered during the investigation into the burglaries as well as information regarding the sale of narcotics from the residence led to the arrests. He would not say what drugs were seized, or in what quantities.

Two handguns and proceeds of several burglaries, including \$30K in cash and jewelry, were recovered from the residence. The cash and jewelry were photographed to be used as evidence at trial, then returned to their respective owners.

On August 26 of last year, Garrett Lake was the victim of a stabbing on the front lawn of his home. He had been stabbed multiple times in his torso, along with another victim who was also stabbed. Both were transported to area hospitals with non-life threatening injuries. A juvenile was charged in that incident.

Council Clash Over Truck Route Continues

Mayor Charlie Butrico and Council President Rob Bengivenga continue to have opposing views on the issue of the borough's safest truck route.

At their May 12 meeting, the Borough Council voted to remove the weight restrictions on Hamilton Boulevard and Belmont Avenue, thus allowing trucks back on both roadways. Mayor Charles Butrico vetoed the ordinance last Friday and the council was set to override the veto at Monday's meeting.

Trucks were barred from Hamilton Boulevard two years ago by the then-Democratically controlled council and re-routed along St. Nicholas Avenue, South Clinton Avenue to New Market Avenue and Spicer Avenue.

The Republican Majority voted last month to rescind the weight restriction on Hamilton Boulevard after a study by Traffic Safety Officer Lt. Kevin Murtagh

deemed the truck route unsafe.

When the resolution to override the ordinance came up for a vote, Mayor Butrico asked that it be tabled to allow the voters to decide in the fall elections. This suggestion was rejected by a 4-2 vote, along party lines.

The mayor then read a portion of a state statute that said a public official should recuse himself from any vote in which they would have a direct or indirect financial interest. He said that Councilman Rob Bengivenga is employed by Marpal Disposal, a division of Republic Services of New Jersey. Republic Services also owns Midco Waste Systems, a firm located in South Plainfield whose trucks use borough roads, and would benefit from moving trucks back onto Hamilton Boulevard. The current truck route is two miles longer than the Hamilton Boulevard route.

"I work for Marpal Disposal doing business as Republic Services in Monmouth County. I don't work for Midco. or report to Midco, nor do my bosses (Continued on page 14)



The ceremony included a traditional wreath laying and the unveiling of the name "Sgt. Trista L. Moretti" on the NSA/CSS Cryptologic Memorial Wall. The wall, dedicated in 1996, lists the names of 158 Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine and civilian cryptologists who have made the ultimate sacrifice, "Serving in Silence," in the performance of their duties since World War II.

Democracy Week Voters Also Gave Comments

The results of the Democracy Week vote held in May resulted in more than just a yes or no vote for a new library. Voters were asked to add a comment on their ballots and many took advantage of the opportunity.

The vote to fund a new library was rejected by voters. The final vote was 673 against and 489 saying yes to approve borrowing up to \$4.5M. A total of 1,162 votes were cast, less than 10 percent of eligible voters.

Many of those voting yes felt that the town needed a new larger library, but they also felt that the site was not large enough and parking could be a problem. "We have to plan for the future, not just for today," wrote one resident who voted yes.

Those who voted no also said the site was too small and parking was a problem. "No" voters commented that the present library was sufficient, or to expand the library, that a library is not needed and to use the school library instead. One comment suggested that the library should have been built years ago when there was federal money available. "This is a bad time to ask for more money. Another tax that will never end," concluded another voter.

Many voters took the opportunity to express their views on other issues, such as whether trucks should travel on New Market Avenue or Hamilton Boulevard, requesting more bulk pickups and commented on the police, schools, taxes, street cleaners and upgrading Borough Hall.

Members of the Library Board of Trustees have asked for permission to study the comments during their next meeting. They will use the comments to help decide how to proceed in the future.

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
Grant Drama Club Presented Their Version of "Oklahoma!" Jr.

It is an improvement or purpose that the Borough may lawfully undertake as a general improvement, and no part of the cost thereof has been or shall be specially assessed on property specially benefitted thereby.
 - (b) The period of usefulness of the improvement or purpose within the limitations of the Local Bond Law, according to the reasonable life thereof computed from the date of the bonds authorized by this ordinance, is 10 years.
 - (c) The Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly prepared and filed in the



report to Midco. We strictly only service Monmouth and upper Ocean County," Bengivenga said.

Borough Attorney Joseph Sordillo was asked to give an opinion, but said he could not since he needed time to research the question.

Butrico repeated his request to table the two resolutions. This time Bengivenga voted 'no' to table, siting his desire to wait for Sordillo's opinion. The council was then split, 3-3. The decision then fell to the mayor, who can only decide a split vote. Butrico voted to put the resolutions up for a vote by the council.

The council then voted 3-2, along party lines, to pass the resolutions. Bengivenga abstained from voting. Since the vote to override requires a two-thirds majority, the resolutions did not pass.

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The council also voted 4-2 along party lines to abandon the New Market Extension. Butrico said a resolution was not necessary since the council won't approve any funds to continue the extension project. Bengivenga said the resolution was needed because there is the concern that the borough may be liable for environmental remediation costs.

According to former Republican Chair Bob Jones, who did not attend the meeting, "The mayor conveniently failed to read the entire statute to the public. As an attorney who has experience litigating ethics issues, I can state that there is no conflict of interest. One has to wonder why the mayor waited until the eleventh hour to spring this on the council president and why he only read part of the statute. He obviously knew what he planned to say before the

meeting, so why didn't he bring this to Councilman Bengivenga's attention so he could look into it? In addition, why skip parts of the statute that undercut your argument? This is partisan politics at its worst.

"The real conflict belongs to Mayor Butrico and Councilman Scrudato. They live in the area that benefits from the truck detour. Their property values will increase and they will benefit personally by not having trucks in their neighborhood. If anyone should have abstained, it should have been them. Bengivenga does not get any personal benefit from the truck route, unlike Butrico and Scrudato. It's ironic that these two would claim someone else has a conflict of interest," he concluded.

Mayor Butrico disagreed saying, "I read the entire statute and had it double interpretation was correct. Subsection D is very clear and states: No local government officer or employee shall act in his official capacity in any matter where he, a member of his immediate family, or a business organization in which he has an interest, has a direct or indirect financial or personal involvement that might reasonably be expected to impair his objectivity or independence of judgment.' Clearly, Mr. Bengivenga has a direct financial involvement in the company as he draws a paycheck from them and therefore should have abstained from the vote. What bothers me is that he should have abstained from the ordinances as well."

The mayor concluded by saying, "I will continue to do everything in my power to keep trucks off of Hamilton Boulevard."
